MEAT GRAVY.—To make nice meat-gravy (free from lumps), stir the flour into the hot grease before adding the water or milk.

CAMPHOR OINTMENT. - One inblespoonful of brandy, two tablespoonfuls of becawax, three tablespoonfuls of sweet oil, one teaspoonful of strong spirits of camphor.

INDIAN BREAD.—One quart of fine Indian meal, one and one-half pint of wheat flour, three pints of milk, four eggs, two good tablespoonfuls of baking powder, one-fourth-pound of butter.

BUCKWHEAT CAKES.—To make buck-wheat cake, tender and brown, use for wetting the water in which you have boiled your potatoes, or save a spoonful of mashed potatoes, and add to the wetting each time.

A GOOD RECEIPT FOR BURS.—One pound of lour, quarter pound of butter, half pound of currants, quarter of a candied lemon, one dessent spoonful of baking powder, one gill of cold milk, two eggs. Rub the butter lato the four first, and then mix all together.

Paratuse Putinting.—Mix the following

PARADISE PUDDING.—Mix the following ingredients dry: Four ounces each of beel suct and bread crumbs, four tablespeonfuls of moist sugar, a pinch each of salt and grated nutmeg, six large apples chopped small, the grated ring pf. a fresh lemon; two tablespoonfuls of clicky sinc, flavour with the juice of a lemon. Aix well together, and place in a bittered hold, and boil three hours. Serve in with pudding sauce. If haked, it will take hour and a half.

THE ART OF MAKING TEA.—Nothing is more easily made than good tea, and yet how seldom, away from home, does one enjoy fragrant tea. The first thing that is needed is a clean teapot; it is useless to try to make good tea in a musty pot, or one in which the leaves have been allowed to remain all night. The water should be boiling, but the tea itself should never be boiled. I wish these words could be paint in the country. After boiling water has been poured over the tea, set the teapot on an extra griddle on the back of the stove. All that is good in the tea will gradually be extracted from it.

SALT AS A PROPHYLACTIC IN DIPHTHERIA.—In 2 paper read at the Medical Society of Victoria, and published in the "Australian Medical Journal" for June, 1880, "On the Free Use of Salt as a Prophylactic against Diphtheria," Dr. Day stated that, having for many years past looked upon diphtheria in its early stages as a purely local affaction, characterized by a marked tendency to take on putrefactive decomposition, he has trusted more to the f ee and constant application of antiseptical and when their employment has been ach ded from the first, and has been combined with judicious alimentation, he has seldom seen ablood poisoning ensue. In topsequence of the great power which sall possesses in preventing the putrefactive decomposition of most and other organic matter, Dr. Day has often prescribed for diphtheritic patients living far away from medical and the frequent use of a gargle composed of a tablespoonful or more of salt, dissolved in a tumbler of water; giving children who cannot gargle a teaspoonful or two to drink occasionally. During the prevalence of diphtheria he recommends its use instead of sugar in the food of children, adults using the gargle as a prophylactic, three or four times a day.
