

All the guilds and classes of the parish are now in full working order, many of them being reinforced by new workers. The W. A. has already sent out one missionary bale, thanks to the many useful things sent in by members of the congregation in answer to their appeal. The Chancel Guild has begun work on a new white dossal, the designs and general superintendence being furnished from the embroidery room of St. John's Sisterhood. The Sewing School continues to meet at 10.30 on Saturday mornings; and the various other parochial organizations are as usual.

A meeting was recently held in the Guild Room for the purpose of organizing a Young Men's Club. The intention is to have meetings of a literary nature during the winter. Among other suggestions, it is proposed (if a sufficient number take an interest in the Club), to have addresses on popular subjects once a month. At the same time, it is hoped that the literary aspect will not interfere with more material enjoyments. A committee has been appointed to draft a constitution, which is to be submitted to a meeting of the Club on Thursday, November 9th.

Many members of the congregation having asked for the special prayer used by the Rector

at the Celebration on All Saints' Day, it is here appended, with the hope that it will be used daily during the war.

All which we ask in the Name and for the sake of the Prince of Peace, our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.
