CHATTANOOGA, April 2.—On St. Patrick's Day two men from Cincinnati, Charles Gower and Carl Schmitt, entered the cave under Lookout Mountain.

The men had not been seen to come out of the cave, but the gate keeper supposed they did so while he was at dinner.

After being removed to the outside world, the men said that they entered the cave at 9 o'clock on the morning of March 16.

They had only a small lantern, not intending to go far into the cave. After they had proceeded about three miles, Gower stumbled and fell.

They groped their way back a few hundred feet, but found the undertaking useless.

When brought to this city the men presented a pitiable spectacle. The ordeal seemed most severe on Mr. Schmitt.

They were delirious. Late this evening physicians say that the men are doing as well as could be expected.

ANOTHER STEAMBOAT HORROR. Columbus, Ga., April 3.—The steamer Rebecca Everingham was burned to the water's edge early this morning at Fitzgerald Landing on the Chattahoochee River.

The passengers saved escaped in their night clothes. Mrs. A. Van, Miss Simpson, passengers; Julia Anderson, (nursemaid); Richard Coleman, pantryman; Acipho Thomas, fireman; A. Stephens and Randolph Sangers, deckhands, and Bob Griffith, steward, were burned to death.

The boat was valued at \$24,000 and is a total loss. The passengers who escaped have reached this city, some of them severely burned. Thirteen passengers are dead and missing. Besides those already named are J. B. Yates, D. D. Williams, Wm. L. Kennedy, a colored woman and child, and two white men unknown. Captain George H. Whitesides was seriously burned. The steamer was heavily laden with cotton.
