MAJOR WOOLWORTH ST. ANDREWS BEAT
WINS MIXED RACE UPPER CANADAS

Ellsworth C. and Grattan Boy
Land Two Heats Each in
Unfinished Events.

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—(Staff Special).—Monday opened up bright and clear, making it grand weather for ice racing. The track was in splendid condition, the management having had a big group of men and teams at work all night making every preparation for the first day of the second week. The attendance was the largest of any day, the ladies' enclosure was well filled. Three races were held (the Saturday card).

In the 2.10 trot and pace, stake \$1000, with seven entries, Nellie G. was made a favorite, selling even money against the field. Ellsworth C. and Grattan Boy won the first two heats, and Nellie G. won the third, when the race had to be carried over to Tuesday.

The second race was the 2.15 pace, purse \$400, six entries. Major Woolworth was the favorite, and justified the confidence of his supporters by winning three straight heats. Little Alfred, the Ottawa owned horse, was well played and went a good race, but was hardly equal to the pace.

The third race was the 2.22 trot with five starters. Grattan Boy was made the favorite, after winning the first heat easily enough. Arwana, the American owned mare, who had won three races in one week at Montreal, got away and broke into the lead, cutting Grattan Boy off and putting him to a break. Arwana won the heat, but was placed fifth for the interference. Woodpoints in the first heat broke a line and ran for over a quarter of a mile, finished second and being up after the heat was over and turning around to come back. Grattan Boy won the third heat with Arwana second and Woodpoints third. This race was also carried over till Tuesday, when it will be called first on the program, along with Tuesday's card.
