At the end of each story of a game he would have a summary showing the record of each player.

In this way Father Stanton believes that a great deal of the unfair praise which come to the flashly player would be given to the men who really do the work. He figures that a player who does not touch the tall once during tue game mibht be lucky enough to get a loose ball and score the winning touch-down and thus become the hero of the game, without deserving the praise. While it would take great care and considerable trouble to make out these averages, the college football general thinks that two men could easily keep track of everything which might occur on a football field.
