

LABOR OFFICERS ARE PRONOUNCED GUILTY

Only Two of Forty Iron Workers Accused Satisfy Jury of Innocence as to Dynamitings.

AN APPEAL TO BE MADE

Sentence Will Be Passed on Convicted Men Today—Liable to Penalty of 39 Years.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 28.—Thirty-five labor union officials today were found guilty of conspiracy in the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building. The jury, in finding the defendants guilty, also found that the dynamiting was done for the purpose of destroying the property of the Los Angeles Times building.

NATURAL GAS FOR I. C. R. WORKSHOPS

Furnishes Heat, Light and Power at Big Plant of the Government Railway.

MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 27.—The workshops of the Intercolonial Railway are now piped with natural gas, which is being used extensively for the generation of power. Experiments conducted for some time have demonstrated that the natural gas could be used more economically and to better purpose than the producer gas from the railway plant, and this is to be closed down and used in emergency reserve.

The railway plant is now being supplied with the natural gas, which is used under six large boilers and in all the forged and engine houses as well as for heating purposes and for the generation of electricity for both power and light.

Natural gas is being used in the general offices and in the station as fuel, with the most satisfactory results.

Successful experiments have also been made in air lighting and pipe lines now supply the Pithing gas producing plant and the cars passing through Moncton are being lit with natural gas for illumination.

BABES SLEEP IN HIGH PARK WOODS

Four Children Found Beneath a Tree in State of Exposure and Collapse—Lost Their Way.

To become lost in the woods in High Park was the experience of four little children who live in Swansea. They are Mabel Winford, aged 5; Willie Winford, aged 3; Willie and Clarence Scott, aged 5 and 4 respectively. They all live on Park road, Swansea.

They were found in the park about one o'clock Saturday morning sleeping under a tree in a condition of collapse and exposure. All the children had their feet frozen and were in a pitiful state. They were taken to the West Toronto police station, where a physician attended them, and were later removed to their homes.

It seems that the children left home early on Friday afternoon with the intention of spending a short time in the park, but their wanderings took them further than they thought, and when darkness began to fall, they were unable to find their way to the Lake Shore road. After some hours of fruitless wandering about the park the younger children became exhausted and fell down beside a tree and fell asleep. It was very fortunate that some person on his way through the park discovered them and notified the police.

WAITER TAKES CARBOLIC ACID

And Dies in St. Michael's Hospital Thirty Minutes Later—Was Despondent.

Driven to despondency over unemployment, Matthew Sharp, who roomed at 161 Jarvis street, took carbolic acid late Saturday afternoon. He was immediately hurried to St. Michael's Hospital, where he died thirty minutes later. The body was removed to the morgue and an inquest will likely be held.

His relatives are not known. He came to the city from Hamlet, where he was a waiter in a restaurant.
