Paris, Feb. 21.—The pan-African congress, representing the negro peoples of six different nations, today passed a resolution for presentation to the peace conference, giving the outcome of its deliberations. It proposes that the allied and asso-

ciated powers establish an internanegroes, similar to the projected inbe guaranteed the ownership of as much land as can profitably be developed in countries inhabited by them; that slavery, enforced labor and corporal punishment be abolished, except in punishment for crime; that the right be guaranteed to every native child to learn to read and write its own language and also the language of the trustee nation, and that the trustee nation be reonsible for medical care and sani+ tary conditions in negro countries, without discouraging collective or in-

dividual initiative. The resolution covers regulation of the investment of capital, the granting of concessions, political and religious liberty, and demands that groes have equitable -representation all the international institutions of the league of nations.
