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

O It should be stated from the announcements made in the House that it is evident that the Government has discarded the proposed 300-mile section along the Stikine River, as the distance mentioned in the contract with McKenzle and Mann, places the total mileage at about 150 miles. Mr. Jennings classifies the 300-mile rever section as medium work, which can be built for \$22,000 per mile. The bridge over the river would cost \$80,000; docks, sidings and freight houses he puts at \$6000, or a total of \$746,000.

On the section from the Stikine to Teslin Lake, whether commencing at Glenora.
