

ADVANTAGES OF THE PROJECTED CROSS-TOWN ROUTE.

The above is a sketch of the proposed cross-town route as it should be laid out, in the opinion of The World, to relieve the overcrowding of the other routes and to afford much-needed convenience to those living along the projected line. It is possible to extend the route from Arthur-street westward, so as to reach Dufferin-street, south of College-street, or even south of Dundas-street. This would extend the mileage of the route on Duffer in-street, which would be a desirable fea-

ture on account of the importance of that thorofare. An extension to St. Lawrence Market by way of George-street should be part of the project, and perhaps another by Simcoe-street to Union Station.

It will be noted that the projected route gives a right of way from Toronte Junction and East Toronto village, Cole man and the eastern suburbs generally thru the centre of Toronto and to St. Lawrence Market. It also makes a connection

with York Township at Dufferin-street and Davenport-road.

The extension of the line a couple of miles eastward from Greenwood-avenue would enable it to share in the lucrative business of the eastern suburbs, which is already as much as the Toronto Railway can handle. There are three thousand permanent residents in this neighborhood and six thousand during the summer. The resident summer population is increasing at the rate of from one to two thousand a year. The summer excursion business is, as everyone knows, enormous. The permanent residents, summer and winter, all use the cars very extensively. If a competing company were to offer a five-cent rate from East Toronto to the centre of the city it would obtain valuable franchises, which cannot be obtained by the Toronto Rail-

The building of this new route by an independent company, or by the city itself, would solve the suburban railway problem, as well as immensely improve the ser-
