

## GRAND LODGE I.O.O.F. MEETS

Larger Number of Delegates Than  
Ever in Attendance at Open-  
ing Session.

A WELCOME TENDERED THEM.

Encouraging Reports of the Year's  
Proceedings and on the Order's  
Standing Presented.

Fully five hundred delegates were  
in attendance Wednesday morning at  
the opening of the convention of the  
Grand Lodge of the Independent Order  
of Oddfellows in Victoria, Hall, Grand  
Master Charles Clifford Lyman, Brook-  
ville, presiding. A hearty welcome  
was extended to the visitors by Aid.  
Oliver on behalf of the city, which  
was graciously replied to by the Grand  
Master.

After routine, the reports of the  
secretary and other officers and com-  
mittees were presented. Important  
among these was the report of the  
Advisory Committee to the Oddfellows  
Relief Association of Kingston, the in-  
surance affiliation of the order for  
Canada, presented by Col. W. H. Cole,  
P.G.M., showed a gratifying increase  
in the membership of the association  
for the year ending June 30, of 1073,  
an increase of over 8 per cent. Total  
membership is 14,150, of whom 10,  
008 belong to the Province of Ontario,  
showing what a strong hold the insti-  
tution has on this jurisdiction. The  
amount of death and disability claims  
for the last year was \$100,750, being  
\$8000 less than the previous year. The  
revenue from all sources for the year  
was \$184,012.39. Total expenditure for  
all purposes \$130,927, leaving a surplus  
of \$53,085.46. This shows a gain in  
the amount of insurance of ten per  
cent, and a financial gain of 22 1/2  
per cent. The Grand Lodge unani-  
mously adopted the resolution of the  
report that the Grand Lodge of Ontario  
continue its recognition of the  
association and all members of the  
jurisdiction take advantage of the  
benefits accruing from being connected  
therewith.

At the opening of the afternoon  
session a pleasing interchange of in-  
ternational greetings took place. Grand  
Master Lyman presented the visiting  
Grand Master of New York State,  
John P. Kellas, a handsome silk flag,  
bearing the Canadian coat of arms  
as an expression of the kindest greet-  
ings of the Canadian jurisdiction and  
a memento of his visit to the Grand  
Lodge of Ontario. Kellas made a  
particularly appropriate and elo-  
quent speech in reply, expressing his  
appreciation of the token which he  
would ever cherish in the spirit in  
which it was given. The Grand Lodge  
showed hearty appreciation of his ad-  
dress.

Rep. J. J. Mason, Bowmanville, pre-  
sented the report of the Committee  
on Mileage and Per Diem, which was  
adopted. It provided for the payment  
to officers, representatives and mem-  
bers serving on committees of mile-  
age and per diem at the usual rate.  
The report of the Rebekah Degree  
read by Representative J. H. Radford,  
recommended the granting of charters  
to three newly instituted Rebekah De-  
grees, and urged greater co-operation  
by the subordinate lodges in promot-  
ing the work of the Rebekah Degree.  
Fraternal greetings were exchanged  
with the Independent Order of Forest-  
ers, now in session in Windsor, and  
the Grand Lodge, on report of the  
Committee on Fraternal Relations, pre-  
sented by R. B. Butt, chairman. Bino,  
in sympathy to the Masonic Grand  
Lodge on the death of its chief officer,  
Grand Master Hungerford, and to the  
Orange Order, on the death of their  
Grand Master, Clark Wallace.

The need for more diligence in some  
districts in regard to weak and dor-  
mant lodges was recommended by the  
Committee on the State of the Order,  
presented by Representative S. J. Mil-  
lar of Norwich. Gratification was ex-  
pressed, however, at the large increase  
in membership during the past year.  
The granting of charters to new  
lodges: Bertie Lodge, Ridgeway, New  
Ontario, No. 340, Thessalon, Blisset  
Lodge, No. 31, Mitchell (re-instated),  
Russell Lodge, No. 341, Russell, Van-  
kleeck Hill, No. 432, Vanekleek Hill, was  
approved by Grand Lodge on motion  
of Representative R. H. Sweet of  
Exeter. Also the Mergement of Ox-  
ford and Samaritan Lodges, Ingersoll.  
Congratulations were extended to Re-  
presentative John Dawson, D.D.G.M.,  
of Port Arthur, for instituting a lodge  
in New Ontario at Thessalon.

Permission was given Bro. H. A.  
Mallory, of Drayton, to institute a new  
lodge at Drayton, Ont.  
No change in clause 98, subordinate  
constitution, re widow's benefit, was  
made by the grand body on motion  
of Rep. W. R. Hall, of Chatham.  
The question of adopting the In-  
dependent Oddfellows Journal as the of-  
ficial organ of the jurisdiction and be-  
ing sent free to every member on an  
increase of the Grand Lodge per capita  
tax was laid on table for discussion  
at 11 a. m. Thursday.

called attention to the value of the  
new law, which abolished the payment  
of benefits for the first week of sick-  
ness.

The report of the committee approv-  
ing of this change effected two years  
ago, was referred back on motion of  
Representative J. Dawson of Sault  
Ste. Marie and R. McQuade of Col-  
lingwood, that the payment of first  
week's benefits be left optional  
with the lodge.  
The judgment and skill with which R.  
K. Cowan, K. C., Grand Lodge Solicitor,  
dealt with the legal matters trust-  
ed to him during the year was com-  
mended by Grand Lodge, on motion of  
Representative G. A. Griffith, of Orillia,  
for Committee on Legislation.

A useful recommendation made by  
Representative Britton, of Hamilton,  
for the Committee on Legislation, was  
adopted by the grand body on a two-  
thirds vote. It gave the privilege of  
new lodges, situated where a lodge  
had once existed, to use the last con-  
secutive number, instead of the number  
of the definite lodge, as this shows the  
period of institution.  
The Grand Lodge adopted a recom-  
mendation of the Grand Secretary to  
change grand lodge bylaw, No. 17, in  
order that both grand and subordinate  
lodge elections may take place on the  
same evening in May.

A warm discussion was participated in  
by Representatives Blewett, Listowel, W.  
H. Cole, P. G. M., Jos. Oliver, P. G. M.,  
O. L. L. L., and W. H. Hoyle, P. G. M., on the amendment  
proposed by Representative Cole, of  
Brock Lodge, Brockville, to allow each  
subordinate lodge to legislate as it  
desires as to the payment of widows'  
benefits. Brock Lodge has, up to the  
adoption of a uniform constitution for  
subordinates at the 1900 session, been  
paying a graded scale of widows' bene-  
fits.  
The great opposition to the  
amendment was that it would give sub-  
ordinate lodges the right to legislate as  
they saw fit, and thus destroy the uniformity  
of subordinate constitutions, which was  
essential to stability, and pro-  
gress. After a lengthy debate the  
amendment was lost.

The concluding business of Wednes-  
day's session was devoted to the con-  
sideration of a motion by Representa-  
tive Jos. Oliver, P. G. M., to change  
the days of meeting of the annual  
session from Wednesday and Thurs-  
day to Thursday and Friday, in order  
to allow delegates to attend the ses-  
sions of the Grand Encampment, which  
are now held on Tuesday of the Grand  
Lodge week. The Grand Lodge voted  
to keep to the old meeting days.  
Among the visitors of the session  
was Brother Jos. Gibson, of Ingersoll,  
the Grand Master of the A. O. U. W.,  
accompanied by the Grand Recorder  
of the same order, Mr. M. D. Carder,  
who addressed the Grand Lodge and  
extended the greetings of 35,000 mem-  
bers of the A. O. U. W. Brother F.  
D. Selfert, a past grand of Columbia  
Lodge, No. 10, Washington, D. C., was  
introduced as a visitor by Representa-  
tive J. T. Hornbrook and J. A. Mac-  
Donald.

dating large vessels. It is proposed to increase its capacity so as to enable it to take the largest vessels trad-  
ing, or likely to trade, upon these waters.

The Company, since the first of January, 1901, has been engaged in the construction of steel steam-  
ships, and the Directors have satisfied themselves that the condition of the grain and ore-carrying trade will assure

feet moulded depth, to be completed May and June of next year.
