

# TO TRY AND DEVELOP AESTHETIC ARTURE FOR PUBLIC OWNED ROAD

First Exhibition of the Arts and  
Handicrafts Society of Canada  
is Now Open.

Last night the Arts and Crafts Society of Canada opened their first exhibition in the galleries of the Ontario Society of Artists, 165 West King-street, with a reception and private view. There was a large and very representative attendance from the artistic circles of Toronto, and the occasion was graced by the presence of the Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. Clark, who were received with the national anthems. No formal speeches were made, the time being devoted to examination of the numerous exhibits and the exchange of social courtesies.

The society was founded last year for the encouragement of original design and the individual expression of the artist. It is a non-profit-making organization, and its objects are to promote the art of the craftsman, to encourage the production of original Canadian work, and to provide a medium for the sale of such work. The society is now open for the exhibition of its work, and the public is invited to see the same.

The exhibition is made up of two classes of work—working drawings and finished work. The former is made up of architectural drawings, and the latter of work in various media, including painting, sculpture, and handicrafts. The exhibition is open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., and the public is invited to see the same.

LYNCHBAUGH CASE  
Now Being Heard Before the U.S. Supreme Court.

Washington, April 6.—Argument was heard to-day in the supreme court in the case of Thomas Lynchbaugh vs. James Lynchbaugh, involving an interpretation of the extradition treaty with Great Britain.

Lynchbaugh is an Irishman, who, while residing on Achill Island, in 1886, made a murderous assault on his landlady, Mrs. Agnes S. McDowell, and was sentenced to imprisonment for life. Escaping in 1903, he came to the United States. He was arrested in Indianapolis, Ind., and extradition proceedings were commenced.

The question before the supreme court deals especially with the character of the offence. The government contends that the crime was an act of violence, and that it was within the scope of the extradition treaty.

The defence contends that the crime was an act of domestic violence, and that it was not within the scope of the extradition treaty. The court will decide the matter.
