When the troupe was massed on the stage there were ten in all, six men and four women. Two of the women were hog fat, and one was white. It is said that these people had never been on any stage before as large as the Carson Opera House (and never will again). People from Tonopah insist that two of the end men had their minstrel schooling in a saloon near the foot of Mount Oddie, and that one of the jokesmiths had done time The lady interlocutor is not identified, but she has a marvelously fine voice, with a good range and as sweet and clear as a bell.
