### WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION

### SAYS THERE WAS TOO MUCH KICKING

Had It Not Been for This, Track Ele-  
vation Would Have Been Secured.

"It is all very well for Ald. Matthews  
to talk about what the Grand Trunk  
will not do," said an alderman this  
morning, "but it was his kicking when  
the first negotiations were being con-  
ducted that put a stop to the whole  
business. He and one or two other  
aldermen held up the whole transaction,  
and now the city is in much worse po-  
sition than it ever was. You can fig-  
ure it out that the city will have to  
pay the price. Nothing will be done  
this year, and when negotiations are  
conducted the citizens will not get any  
better terms than they were offered in  
the beginning, and in the meantime  
several years will be lost."

### OCEAN SUPREMACY

Our Contest With Germany for the  
Atlantic Record.

London, Aug. 28.—For a long time  
England and Germany have been fight-  
ing hard for the command of the At-  
lantic, and the struggle now appears  
to be settling down into one between  
turbines and reciprocating engines.

At present the fastest ship in actual  
service is the Kaiser Wilhelm II, of  
the North-German Lloyd Line, and she  
actually crosses in six days. The  
turbine Cunarder Lusitania, which  
makes her maiden trip from the Mer-  
sey Sept. 7, is expected to reach New  
York within five days. The North-  
German Lloyd, anticipating the kudos  
which Great Britain is likely to receive  
from such a record, has built the  
Kronprinzessin Cecilie, which is fitted  
with reciprocating engines, the Ger-  
mans contending that the turbines are  
not the success claimed for them.

The Lusitania and Lusitania will  
both leave Liverpool on Sept. 7. The  
former holds the record of five days  
eight hours from Queenstown to Sandy  
Hook, and the race is likely to prove  
the most exciting ocean contest for  
many years. Every berth on the world's  
biggest ship is already engaged.

The agents of the Cunard Company  
say that they will not be satisfied un-  
less the Lusitania wins by a margin of  
twenty hours.

Meanwhile the Kronprinzessin Ce-  
cilie has made her maiden voyage  
from Southampton to New York, tak-  
ing five days, twenty-two hours and  
forty-five minutes.

### THE HYPOCRISIT SCORES.

London, Aug. 28.—The theatrical  
season opened in London last night  
with the first performance here of  
Henry Arthur Jones' "The Hypocrite,"  
which ran for a year in America. Mr.  
Charles Frohman produced the play  
here at the Hicks Theater. Almost all  
the critics this morning applauded the  
play and admit that it is bound to be a  
great box office magnet.

### WARSHIP EXPLOSION.

Lisbon, Aug. 28.—An explosion of  
gas occurred today on board the Por-  
tuguese battleship Vasco da Gama.  
Several sailors were injured, but no  
death has been reported.

Critics in the larger cities are sometimes

from Tonopah insist that two of the end  
men had their minstrel schooling in a  
saloon near the foot of Mount Oddie, and  
that one of the jokesmiths had done time.

The lady interlocutor is not identified, but  
she has a marvellously fine voice, with a

bell. She sang "The Holy City" to a sort  
of jig time, but the audience did not notice  
any radical defects, as they were disposed  
to treat the performers with lenient hos-  
pitality. The octonion lady dancer wore

to keep time when she shuffled the pigeon  
wings, and her dress was evidently made  
for a shorter person. The performers  
changed off with the orchestra, and when  
the proper time came a performer would  
hop over the footlights and fall aboard of  
the piano, while the piano thumper would  
climb up and take the other fellow's place  
in the cork line. If an artist wanted to  
change a costume he merely took his coat  
off in sight of the audience and turned it  
wrong side out. To make another change  
he would turn it inside out. There was one  
artist who could change the expression of  
his face without leaving the stage. They  
announced, when the curtain fell on them,  
that they would play a return engagement  
in the near future. If an artist had a rea-  
sonable committee, Sheriff Kinney went to the  
depot with them, and advised them official-  
ly not to think of coming back until his  
term had expired.
