He declared again that since the military service act was passed, it should be obeyed. "Tuesday night an enemy squadron of twenty ships penetrated the Gulf of Riga and at 3 o'clock the next morning was discovered making its way through the channels south of Moon Sound. The squadron included two battleships of the Koenig type. Our detachments under Admiral Bakhireff, who hoisted his flag on the cruiser Bayan, accompanied by the battleships Gridanin and Slava, steaned from the eastern part of Moon Island to engage the enemy, preceded by torpedo-boat patrols, which withdrew before the enemy.

"At 9:30 o'clock the enemy opened fire on our torpedoboats and our detachment, issuing from the channel, took up battle formation in a radius between the Werden and Weiland lighthouses near Moon island. While approaching the enemy the cruiser Bayan was attacked unsuccessfull; by a hostile submarine.


