An "Easy-to-Make" Design.

2022—Ladies' Apron.

But little time, material and labor
will be required to make this neat and
serviceable apron, which may serve as
a morning work dress as well as an
apron. It is comfortable, and allows
freedom of movement. (Gingham, lawn,
seersucker, chambray, drill, linen, al-
paca, brilliantine and satin are all
good apron materials. The neck edge
may be finished square or in "V" out-
line. The fullness may be obtained by
a belt or drawstring run through a
casing. The garment may be slipped
over the head or closed on the shoul-
ders. This pattern is cut in four sizes,
small for 32 and 34 inches bust mea-
sure, medium for 36 and 38 inches bust
measure, large for 40 and 42 inches
bust measure, and extra large for 44
and 46 inches bust measure. It requires
5 1/2 yards of 36-inch material for a
medium size.
