Clothing, consisting of coat, vest and pants or coat and pants, men's and boys', in excess of \$45. be imposed, levied and collected on the total purchase price of the articles hereinafter specified, and on articles of clothing, the said tax may be imposed.

Cloth overcoats, men's and boys', we men's and misses', in excess of \$5 hereinafter specified, and on articles of clothing, the said tax may be imposed. clothing, the said tax may be imposed upon the combined selling price of ma-terials and cost of manufacture when

from suits, in excess of \$5 each. Shirts, including night shirts, men's and boys', in excess of \$3 each.

Hats, bonnets and hoods, wome and misses', in excess of \$12 each.
