

ALLIED SUPREME COUNCIL APPROVES REPARATIONS PLAN WILL COLLECT 226,000,000 GOLD MARKS FROM GERMANY

ORGANIZATION OF WHEAT POOL TO AND GROWERS IS NOW UNDER WAY

Officials of Farmers' Organizations Meeting in Winnipeg.

MAY INCLUDE ONTARIO

Col. J. F. Fraser of U. F. O. Is Attending Conference.

Winnipeg, Jan. 29.—Actual organization of a wheat pooling scheme to handle Western Canada's crop started in Winnipeg this morning, when outstanding leaders of farmers' organizations from all Canada gathered at the conference. Officials of the Canadian council of agriculture would make no statement until Monday. Members of special wheat pool committee to assemble here are H. W. Wood, representing United Farmers of Alberta, J. A. Maharg, M. P. of Saskatchewan Grain Growers' Association; J. L. Brown, United Farmers of Manitoba; Col. J. F. Fraser, United Farmers of Ontario; F. J. Collier and C. Rice Jones, United Grain Growers, Winnipeg; J. Robinson and Hon. George Langley of the Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator Company, said the coming of the Ontario delegate is taken to mean that the pool will embrace that province. The western wheat crop in 1920 amounted to 234,138,300 bushels. A proposed formation of the pool would mean an immense amount of grain is recognized as a stupendous undertaking. Local officials of the United Farmers of Manitoba said today. They were of opinion that only tentative plans would be made at the meeting today as pool will require much thought and numerous meetings of committee.

FARMERS RAP POLICY OF BIGGS

Want Better Small Roads—
Bill to Supervise Girls' Employment.

Toronto, Jan. 28.—Supporters of the Drury Government met in caucus at the Parliament Buildings this morning. Hon. P. C. Biggs was called upon to explain the policy of his department concerning public highways. Rural members criticized the administration, not so much on account of the money expended, but because they were not satisfied that the government was doing sufficient along the lines of improving the small roads.

EMPLOYMENT OF GIRLS.
Toronto, Jan. 28.—The Drury Government during the present session will introduce a bill making it compulsory for all restaurant keepers to take out a license before employing white girls. Senator William Proudfoot, who is a supporter of the bill, said today. He had an interview with Hon. W. R. Rollo this morning.
"We cannot discriminate against the Chinese," said the minister of labor. "We will make it compulsory for restaurant keepers to take out a license in which they are operating for a license to employ white girls. The municipality will then be able to exercise its discretion in giving the license. They will be able to investigate the conditions in the places where the girls have to work."

HE INTENDS TO INCREASE
ONTARIO'S MINING TAXES

HON. HARRY MILLS, minister of mines for Ontario, who proposes to jump the tax on gold and silver mines from three per cent to four per cent of the net profits up to \$1,000,000, and from five to seven per cent on profits over \$1,000,000, said today. 12 PER CENT DIVIDEND.
Toronto, Jan. 28.—After having paid dividends at the rate of 10 per cent for eight years, the Canada Permanent Mortgage Corporation, at the annual meeting of the shareholders here today, decided to place the dividend on a basis of 12 per cent, three per cent to be distributed in the next quarterly dividend. The annual statement, issued a couple of weeks ago, showed that the reserve was equal to the paid-up capital of \$6,000,000. In view of this fact, President W. G. Goodenough today hinted that the directors might feel justified in making smaller additions to the rest.

Uprising Led By Eleven Mexican Brothers Treated As Joke By Govt. Circles

Mexico City, Jan. 29.—Official circles in this city are inclined to treat the reported uprising, led by the eleven Arrieta brothers, in the state of Durango as a matter of inconsequential importance. Announcement was made by the war department last night denying rumors that the Arrietas had captured Canatlan, in the state of Durango, and were threatening the city of Durango. It was stated, however, that sufficient troops had been dispatched to that region to assure a hasty return of normal conditions.
It is asserted the Arrietas have not more than 200 men, against whom the federal forces number over 25,000.

MAY BECOME MINISTER OF MILITIA

Statements that the Dominion Cabinet will shortly be reorganized are accompanied by reports that Gen. Sir Edward Morrison, commander of the Canadian artillery in the great war, will become minister of militia.

Protests Against Action, But Court Declares Jail Best Place for Women.

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GERMANY TO BE FORCED TO PAY 226,000,000 GOLD MARKS TO ALLIES WITHIN NEXT 42 YEARS

Committee Charged by Supreme Council With Formulation of Plan to Solve Reparations Problem Returns Report—
Discounts Will Be Allowed Germany to Induce Prompt Payments—Allies Would Seize Customs and Impose New and Heavier Taxes in Case of the Germans Defaulting in Payments.

Paris, Jan. 29.—The Allied supreme council today approved the German reparations plan drafted by its special committee last night.

The plan provides for the payment by Germany of 226,000,000 gold marks in forty-two annual installments, on a rising scale, beginning with payments of 2,000,000 marks the first year, and in addition, the payment of a 12 per cent tax on German exports.

The plan was in the hands of the printer early this morning, and will be signed when the council meets for its second session today at 4 o'clock.

The plan will be communicated to the Germans in a few days, and they will be invited to a conference on February 28 to consider the terms.

In the meantime, the Brussels council of economic experts will resume its sessions February 7.

The penalties provided in the reparations plan are, in general, the same as under the treaty of Versailles, including both military and economic measures.

Paris, Jan. 29.—Germany would be required to pay 226,000,000 gold marks in 42 annual installments under the plan submitted to the supreme council today by the committee charged with the formulation of a reparations plan which would meet the divergent views of the allied leaders.

The first two installments would be 2,000,000 marks, the next three, 3,000,000 marks, and the next three, 4,000,000 marks; the next three, 5,000,000 marks, and the next 31 of 6,000,000 marks each.

In addition, Germany would be required to pay a 12 per cent tax on her exports, this tax, calculated on the basis of German exports in 1913, would total a little more than 1,500,000,000 gold marks.

The plan submitted would place the burden of the payment of the reparations on the German people, and not on the German government.

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PROTESTANT LOANED FUNDS FOR BISHOP FALLON'S EDUCATION

Alexander Gunn, Kingston, Put Him Through College.

ROMAN CATHOLIC CLAIMS.

In Expenditure on Collegiate To Be Put Before the Public.

How Alexander Gunn, a leading Protestant of the city of Kingston, advanced him financial aid to go to college, after he had matriculated at Queen's University, was told by Right Rev. Bishop M. F. Fallon, in an address Friday evening to the London Knights of Columbus.

It was a story, Bishop Fallon declared, which he had never told before.

The bishop was 16 years old, and upon securing his matriculation, learned that his father was not in circumstances which would warrant sending his son to college without great hardship.

Other members of the family, he said, had no money, and he was forced to leave home and go to college.

The facts came to the attention of Mr. Gunn, who during his political career once defeated Sir John A. Macdonald in a parliamentary contest in Kingston constituency, and Mr. Gunn generously advanced all the funds that the ambitious Catholic boy required for the education of a boy at St. Peter's Seminary.

In the course of his address, the bishop stated that within the year he intended to place before the province, the claims of the Catholic ratepayers to electoral rights in having something to say in the expenditure of their money for Collegiate Institute education.

He explained that the people of Ontario would take a fair attitude in the matter, and the Catholics would receive justice for the "thousands of decent, high-minded, honorable, straightforward and God-fearing Protestants."
