PARKS COMMISSION AGAIN OBSTRUCTED

Special Committee Declines to Send on to Council Application for Legislation.

The special committee on parks reorganization declined yesterday to pass on to council a recommendation to apply for legislation re a parks commission, along the lines drawn up by the city solicitor.

Controller Spence claimed that, although the board of control had refused to pass the application to the legislature, someone did so, thereby hitting again at collusion between Controller Hocken and the city solicitor. Controller Spence said he was willing to have the matter passed on without recommendation for or against. "It can't go that way," returned Controller Hocken sharply. "I didn't want it to come before the board of control and then be thrown out because it hasn't been recommended. I don't want any monkey business of that kind."

Controller Hocken's motion was then lost on a tie vote. Ald. Hales and Ald. A. A. A. voting with him and Controller Spence, Ald. Chisholm and Bengough against. Previously on suggestion of Controller Hocken, the bill as drafted by Mr. Chisholm was amended in two respects. A clause was inserted so that any disposal of park land by a commission could only be accomplished with the approval of the city council. A section setting forth that bylaws need not be submitted to the electors authorizing the issue of debentures was struck out.

The street railway applied yesterday to the Ontario Railway Board regarding the city's objection to its proposed line on Adelaide-street from York-st. to Church-st. The application said that the city's objection to the proposed line of the railway's plans for the line. The company asks for an order to compel the giving of a valid objection and asks that the city be restrained from interfering with the construction of the said line.

The board decided not to oppose the bill before the legislature to amend the Ontario Railway Act so as to allow members to ride free on the street cars. The board voted \$10,000 to the House of Industry, thereby supplementing a recent grant of \$13,000. The city's usual donation to the institution is \$12,000.

Archibald McMurtry and Henry O'Hara, directors, who appeared before the board, showed difference of opinion as to the sum needed. Mr. McMurtry holding that a total of \$25,000 would be sufficient, while Mr. O'Hara maintained that \$30,000 was required. It was stated that there are 250 families being looked after, as against 750 at the same time last year.

The latest applicants for the park commission are H. H. Little, 30 Grosvenor-street, and G. H. Conley, 22 Vermont-avenue.

The United States fleet will visit China. John W. Stewart of Middlebury, the governor of Vermont, was appointed to the United States Senate by Governor Proctor to fill the vacancy caused by the recent death of Senator R. Proctor of that state.

The Russian Senate, the highest tribunal in the empire, has overruled the appeal made by 17 members of the House of Nobles, who on Dec. 31, were convicted by the court of appeal and sentenced to three months' imprisonment. Allan Bogue of Westminster died at the age of 76.

Addressed Unemployed. The unemployed, several hundred strong, again gathered on the Central Market this morning, and were addressed by Socialist orators. Another deputa-tion waited upon the mayor, who said work on pavements, etc., would be started by April 1. One of the deputations that waited upon the mayor fell in a fit just outside the mayor's office. The board of works will inspect the streets Wednesday afternoon, and recommend to council Monday evening that work be started at once.

OLD AGE PENSIONS.

W. A. Sherwood Points Out Why They Are Necessary.

From the viewpoint of W. A. Sherwood, who addressed the Progressive Club last night, the old Canadian, Ontario and British Columbia, are much in need of an old age pension system. From Ontario, he had been a strong proponent, young blood to the newer provinces, the older residents who, had, when young, cleared Ontario, were left with little means of support to face the mortgages. British Columbia deserved the old age pension system because of conditions arising from Asiatic immigration.

"If the aged white men could not go into gardening because the Chinese appeared to have claimed this trade for their own. In the lumber industry the whites could not lay up enough capital to keep them in their old age, because it was their nature. They would attach themselves to a camp in the fall and emerge in the spring, owning the company. The increasing number of Asiatic mill hands, practically placed this branch of work beyond the white man's pale. It was the white, nevertheless, who really did the development of the country, and for this service he should receive substantial recognition in his declining years. Many men were kept too busy developing the country, or defending it, to lay up reserves."

We could hardly, in this country, launch into the pension system to the extent New Zealand had done, where for 25 years every needy man who had been a resident for a quarter of a century received \$1 a week. Still, Canada had the advantage over New Zealand of not being restricted to a gold currency.

If the age over 15 years appeared to be impractical in Canada, the age limit might be placed above 60 and every needy man of that maturity given \$4 per week.

The maximum cost to the country would not exceed \$15,000,000.
