fighting has been established at Bilbao, Spain, and will open its doors on July 1. It will take the place of the famous Se-ville bullfighters' school, which was sup-pressed by King Ferdinand VII., early in the nineteenth century. The new university will grant two de-grees, licentiate and doctor of tauromachy and its courses will be both practical and theoretical. The students will attend lec-tures on the history of bullfighting, the classic and romantic school, the anatomy of the bull and the horse, the study of arms, and the biographies of great bull-fighters. It is heped that the new univer-sity will rescue the national sport from the decadence into which it has fallen lately.
