## NEW TAX LAWS HELD BACK ON TWO QUESTIONS

**Matter of License Fee And Rates Still To Be Determined**  
**DRIVERS HEARD AT COUNCIL MEETING**  
**Commissioners Divided On Section Which Will Be Gone Into Later**

Arguments by the taxmen for and against the adoption of the proposed new tax law were heard this morning by the members of the City Council, and the suggested by-law was approved with the exception of a section which deals with the time of issuing the licenses and the fee to be charged. The adoption of the by-law was deferred until this section has been adopted.

Maurice Garvin said he had seen a copy of the proposed by-law and had shown to a large number of the taxmen, who were in favor of having it adopted, with the exception of the clause requiring the men to wear the badge on the left breast.

Commissioner Wigmore said he had been told by some of the taxmen that they thought the old law was all right, and they were very much opposed to any change in it.

Commissioner Harding said the changes made were only minor ones and to enable a better carrying out of the law.

**FAVORS OLD LAW**  
William Cooper said he was in favor of the old law and he strongly objected to the proposition to issue the licenses May 1 instead of January 1. He charged that this provision of the by-law had been violated and that 15 or 16 licenses had been issued after the time limit.

Acting Mayor Prink asked if the tax board had been functioning, and Mr. Cooper said it had not, and the acting Mayor asked in what way it had not functioned. Mr. Cooper said the tax board had not been properly inspected, and he was in favor of the chief of police being placed in charge of that matter.

**MATTER OF RATES**  
Mr. Garvin said he had been a member of the board since it was formed and they had had many things to contend with. He also referred to the cutting of rates and the metered taxis and advocated the issue of the license to the man who cut rates as well as the man who overcharged.

Commissioner Wigmore asked if Mr. Garvin would be in favor of having all taxis metered, and Mr. Garvin said he would not.

It was then decided to take the by-law up section by section. The first section abolishing the metered taxis and the issuing of licenses in the hands of the Mayor was approved.

**DATE OF LICENSE.**  
The second section provided that licenses be issued May 1 instead of January 1 and the fee be \$10 for a six passenger car, \$15 for a six or seven passenger car and \$25 for all over seven passenger cars.

Commissioner Wigmore said there had been objection to the increase in rate from \$15 to \$25 for the buses and he would vote against this section for the present. The vote on this stood two for approval and two against and the section was not dealt with.

Section 11 that each driver carry his license and copy of by-law, which should be shown on request to any passenger or police officer. Section 12 that before starting a trip out of the city a price be agreed upon between the taxi man and his passenger. Section 13 that a fine of \$20 be imposed for violations of the by-law. **Unemployment Report For March**  
During the month of March 1936 women and 143 men secured employment through the local government employment agency, which is about the same number as the placements in the previous month. There are at present 288 names on the file of the agency. During the first part of March employment conditions were good, but during the last two weeks conditions were quiet. William J. Ryan, manager of the agency said.

While many men are employed at the winter port, lumbering operations in the woods had been practically completed, with the result that there was an influx of men seeking work. Since January 1, there has been about a four per cent. increase in the number of persons placed in employment, compared with the same period last year.
