

TWENTY HOME RUNS MADE IN MAJOR LEAGUES YESTERDAY

GIANTS SECURE SEVEN OF THE CIRCUIT DRIVES

Hack Wilson Ties Record—Ruth Gets Two

NEW YORK, July 2.—Twenty big league home runs, all in the same afternoon, are giving the fans considerable food for argument today as to the lively ball. Seven of the big blows were made by the Giants, as they won a double-header from the Phillies and returned to first place ahead of the Pirates.

TIES MODERN RECORD. Irish Meusel socked for the circuit in the first game, which the McGraw clan won, 6 to 4, and then slammed two more in the concluding number, which the Giants also won, 10 to 7. Hack Wilson contributed two in the second game for the Giants, both coming in one inning, in which his club made nine runs. His feat tied the modern record established in 1922 by Ken Williams of the Browns. Babe Ruth's bat, long dormant, tuned in and hung up a pair in the fray with the Red Sox, helping the Yankees to win, 11 to 8. He is now credited with five homers this season. His team mate, Bob Meusel, who is a brother of Irish Meusel, poked out his 18th four-bagger of the year.

SECURES FOUR HITS. The Robins yesterday trounced the Braves, 4 to 3. Stock's triple in the ninth paying the way for victory. Stock hit safely on four of his five trips to the plate. Neis of Boston participated in the home run carnival with two heavy drives.

CHAMPIONS TO CLASH IN NEW YORK TONIGHT

Mickey Walker And Harry Greb Are Headliners

NEW YORK, July 2.—Some fifty thousand followers of boxing are expected at the Polo Grounds tonight when eight well known fighters take part for good sized purses, in a benefit for the Italian Hospital. A double feature is offered. The welterweight champion, Mickey Walker, of Elizabeth, N. J., fights the middleweight king, Harry Greb, of Pittsburgh, and Harry Wills, negro giant, who has long clamored for a meeting with the heavyweight champion, meets the rejuvenated veteran of Newark, N. J., Chaskey Weiner.

Title At Stake. In the Walker-Greb tussle, a title will be at stake, but only on one side. Walker cannot lose his because his opponent will enter the ring for over the welterweight limit. But Walker may win the crown that the Pittsburgh man took from the head of Johnny Wilson. Greb is the favorite, for he has speed, power and courage considered sufficient to offset the brilliant attack that is sure to come from the sturdy batter from Jersey.

Heavyweights To Meet. No championship will be at stake when Wills and Weiner face each other, but the ambitions of either may be shattered. Far in the offing, very far it would seem, looms a bout with the champion, Dempsey. Wills has sought the opportunity for years. Weiner would cherish the chance. And in coming up to the actual challenge round each has conquered the man who a few years ago sent Dempsey hurrying through the ropes of this selfsame Polo Grounds, Luis Angel Firpo.

Feature Preliminary. In the preliminary Jimmy Slattery, lightning fast middleweight from Buffalo, will face Dave Shade, California welterweight, for six rounds, and Little Joe Lynch, one time champion of the bantams, will fight four rounds against his oldtime rival, Jack Sharkey.

SUCH a play is perhaps better known as blocking the base-runner. This play is attempted by the catcher more than any else on the field due to the fact he is simply protected from the base-runner.

AWARDED DECISION. The rule is very simple covering plays in which a fielder obstructs the path of the base-runner. It states the base-runner shall be entitled to advance a base without liability to be put out if he is prevented from making a base by the obstruction of the fielder.
