Production of Iron and Steel

A report issued today by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics states that the production of 56,983 gross tons of pig iron in Canada during June was a decline of one-third from the 84,987 tons produced in May. This tonnage was the lowest reported for any month this year.

Marked Expansion

There was a very marked expansion in new issues in Canada with the London market during May. According to figures received by the Bankers' Trust Co. information service, the total issue of new issues for the month of May amounted to an amount of \$194,640,000, the highest since last October. It compares with only \$116,000,000 for the month of April, or 29 per cent of the monthly average in 1923—\$115,811,000.

SPRING CHICKENS

Spring chickens are beginning to make their appearance in the Moncton market and on Saturday several pairs were seen. The price varied from 50 to 60 cents a pound. The birds averaged slightly over two pounds in weight.

C. N. R. EARNINGS

The gross earnings of the C. N. R. for the week ended July 14 were \$4,293,485, a decrease of \$428,853 as compared with the corresponding week of 1923. The gross earnings from January 1 to July 14 have been \$123,863,671, a decrease of \$1,099,220.21 as compared with the corresponding period of 1923.
