FRANCE LOOKS FOR 68,000,000,000 GERMAN MARKS

Friendship of Other Allies
For France Referred to by Reporter of Budget Committee of Deputies.

(Canadian Press Despatch).
Paris, Nov. 4.—The maximum amount of reparations which France can hope to receive from Germany is placed at 68,000,000,000 gold marks, or about sixty-one per cent. of the damage suffered, in the outline of the 1922 budget presented to the chamber today by M. Bokanowski, reporter of the budget committee.

The anticipated expenditures of the government for 1922 have been reduced to 24,935,000,000 francs, with receipts of 32,327,000,000 francs, the deficit of 1,626,000,000 francs to be covered by an issue of treasury bonds.

Friendship of Allies.
Referring to the "political" debt contracted with Great Britain and the United States during the war, for the defence against the common enemy, the report declares that the committee would unwillingly be persuaded that it would be unwilling to add fresh difficulties to the grave pre-occupations which assail us and that some day soon the government would be able to bring parliament and the French people to fresh reasons for recognizing and celebrating the active friendship of peoples who were our companions-in-arms in the Great War.

Provincial Memorial Home for Children, Wright Street

To the Protestant People of New Brunswick:

Ladies and Gentlemen:—
The following is a copy of the "Final Decision" of the Board of Directors of the Saint John Protestant Orphan Home, setting forth the terms on which they would absorb the Provincial Memorial Home for Children.

(1) "That the Saint John Protestant Orphan Home will acquire a third building and will take care of every child in the Provincial Memorial Home for Children on date of transfer."

(2) a. "That the Provincial Memorial Home for Children must turn over to the Saint John Protestant Orphan Home all their furniture and furnishings."

b. "That the Provincial Memorial Home for Children apply against their outstanding indebtedness their share of the proceeds from The Protestant Orphan Home Fair recently held. Any excess from same to be turned over to the Saint John Protestant Orphan Home, and should there be any shortage it to be assumed and raised by the Provincial Memorial Home for Children."

(3) "That the Provincial Memorial Home for Children must take care of the mortgage on the Wright Street property."

(4) "Regarding change of name from Saint John Protestant Orphan Home to New Brunswick Protestant Orphan Home."

(5) "That the Provincial Memorial Home for Children must take care of the interest, payable upon the mortgage."

Home for Children furnish the Saint John Protestant Orphan Home with a list of the names of the members of the Provincial Memorial Home for Children's Board of Management; so that the Saint John Protestant Orphan Home may select therefrom the names of two gentlemen and of two ladies, to be added to their present Board of Directors."

The Evening Times Star of Wednesday November 2nd, reports one of the Officers of the Saint John Protestant Orphan Home as saying, that "Every concession possible was made by the Saint John Protestant Orphan Home to effect the union."

After reading the above "Final Decision" of the Saint John Protestant Orphan Home Board of Directors, can anyone see wherein they made concessions?

Another statement reported is "to cut down overhead expenses." The Provincial Memorial Home for Children has not now or never had any overhead expenses. Such as a salaried officer, or paid one cent in commissions to anyone who has collected for it. Every dollar has gone direct to the benefit of the children.

You will notice by sections five and six above that, five directors of the Saint John Protestant Orphan Home were not to resign to make room for five from the Provincial Memorial Home for Children; as was also reported in same article.

Three buildings all agree are a present necessity. Could a more suitable third building than The Provincial Memorial Home building be acquired anywhere else at present, for less than \$600 a month? Which is the amount of the interest, payable upon the mortgage.

South Norwalk, Conn., Nov. 5.—Frank and James McMullen of Oakland, Cal., have started action to break the will of their uncle, the late John McMullen, head of the Atlantic-Pacific Dredging Company, who died last August, claiming that the deceased was mentally incapacitated when he drew his will a few days before his death.
