THIRTEEN INDICTED IN LIQUOR MATTER

Cleveland, Dec. 3.—Thirteen persons were indicted by the federal grand jury in connection with a raid on the yacht Tranquillo, last June, when a cargo of whiskey, alleged to have been brought from Canada, was confiscated. Captain Wm. L. Curry of Montreal, master of the Tranquillo, and Ivy Burns, legal Cleveland sales agent for the transatlantic whiskey, were jointly indicted on charges of conspiracy to violate the prohibition law by alleged sale, transportation and delivery of part of the cargo. Carell, commissioner of streets of Lakewood, and P. S. Christensen, former chief of police of that city, were indicted for alleged unlawful possession of part of the liquor.

SAYS COHAN OWNS BROOKLYN ROBINS Report That Theatrical Man Has Purchased Club Emanates from Chicago. Chicago, Dec. 3.—Despite George Cohan's denial upon landing in New York City that he had purchased a major league baseball club, the Chicago Daily News declares it is believed that he has already secured control of the Brooklyn team, and that the announcement will be made during the meeting of the National League, December 16, in New York. This bit of information, the paper says, is considered authentic, as it came through one of the McKevens, owners of the Brooklyn team, who goes on to say: "It is a known fact that Cohan has been striving to break into major league circles for many years, and before he departed for Europe expressed a wish

to secure a franchise. Rumors had it before he left that he would get either the Brooklyn or New York American League team, but he refused to acknowledge them. He did intimate to a New York newspaper man that he had an option on an eastern team, but was not at liberty to say which one it was, and that he would defer making a definite announcement until he returned from his trip. "Now that the famous theatrical man is back in his organization, and through friends has attempted to get him to take the Boston Red Sox. But Cohan does not wish to interest himself in a baseball venture outside New York. Therefore it is more than probable that the report that he has secured the Brooklyn franchise will develop to be true. "President Ebbets of the Dodgers remarked only a short time ago that he had passed the sixty-year mark and that it was time for him to retire. He said he was willing to do so and that his club was for sale at a certain price. He has been in baseball for more than thirty years, and said he was ready to step out to let a younger man take his place. "It has been often reported that George M. Cohan was to acquire control of a major league baseball club, and just before he sailed for England on the round trip which he has just completed he gave apparent confirmation to the rumor that he would soon appear in the
