LOCAL NEWS

MAYOR HOME.
Mayor Schofield returned to the city this morning after a business trip to Ottawa. He was accompanied by the West Indian representative of the Schofield Paper Co.

SMALL FLOOD.
A plugged catch basin in City road near the Victoria Rink this morning caused a small flood in the middle of the street. A crew from the water and sewerage department cleaned out the catch basin and relieved the difficulty in short order.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING.
A conference between the mayor and members of the vocational training board, which was scheduled for last evening, was postponed on account of the mayor's absence from the city. It is expected that arrangements will be made to hold the meeting soon.

L. O. G. T.
Dominion Lodge, L. O. G. T., No. 445, held an enjoyable session in their new hall in Murray street last evening. About fifty members were present, and after routine business plans were arranged for raising money for the building fund and temperance work in general was discussed. An enjoyable programme of songs, recitations and speeches was then carried out.

METAGAMA PASSENGERS.
The C. P. O. S. liner Metagama is due to sail tomorrow at 6 o'clock for Liverpool with 175 cabin and 800 steerage passengers. Passengers arriving in the city today to sail on the steamer were taken to Seaside Point in a special train, which was made up in the Union Station.

SPRUCE LAKE MAIN.
W. G. Chase, president of the Canada Lock Joint Pipe Co., which has the contract for the construction of the new main from Spruce Lake, arrived in the city last night in connection with the work of his company here. Arrangements are being made to have Mr. Chase address a meeting of the local branch of the Engineering Institute of Canada.

TOWN PLANNING MAP.
A new town planning map of the St. John area is being made by the city engineering department for the town planning commission. The map will show the restricted and unrestricted areas in colors and distinctive markings will be used to indicate the number of houses to the acre. The expense of the work is being borne by the town planning commission.

PREMIER TO FREDERICTON.
Premier Foster left last evening for Fredericton, where he is to attend a meeting of the provincial government, preparatory to the opening of the local legislature tomorrow. Among the matters to be considered at today's session is that of the tenders for the construction of the hydro-electric power house at Musquash and the foundations for the transmission line from Musquash to St. John.

HIKE TO VANCOUVER.
John Doucett and Everett Stewart, both natives of Prince Edward Island but now residing in the city, propose to commence a hike from this city to Vancouver. They called yesterday at the mayor's office and registered for work. Mr. Doucett gave his occupation as a linotype operator. Mr. Stewart is a dental student. Both are residing at the Eldon Hotel, Union street.

POLICE COURT.
No arrests were made during the night and the police court this morning marked "nil" but a case against John Smith, William Mahany and others on a gambling charge was resumed and again postponed until Monday morning. Two of the defendants did not appear in court and the magistrate issued a warning that if no appearance was put in on Monday proceedings would be taken to have them brought before the court.

VERY SUCCESSFUL.
The Young People's Society of St. Philip's church was entertained last evening by Miss Hazel Bushan at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bushan, Leinster street. A successful basket social was held and the sum of \$65 was raised for the benefit of the church. Games were indulged in during the evening. Kenneth Hamilton was auctioneer and at the close of the social the pastor, Rev. Claude Stewart, congratulated the society on the interest taken in church work.

MCDONALD CASE HERE.
Further evidence was taken here this morning at a sitting of the Divorce Court before His Honor Judge Crockett in the case of McDonald vs. McDonald. This matter came before the court some weeks ago in Fredericton but no decision was given. It was undefended. Previous to there had been another suit for damages in which the same parties were involved and it was thought possible by the court that in the divorce action there might have been collusion. Solicitors for the two parties were examined by His Honor and adjournment made for judgment. The husband, who is the defendant in the present action, was not represented today. Dr. J. M. B. Baxter, K. C., appeared for the wife.

SON RESIDES HERE.
Mrs. R. J. Scribner died at her home in St. John's, N. B., on Friday, March 11, aged sixty-nine years. She was buried in the Church of England cemetery there Sunday afternoon, March 13, after service by Rev. Mr. Prescott. She was twice married. Her first husband was the late Thomas Hamilton of St. John's. Besides her husband, she is survived by six sons by her first marriage, W. T. Hamilton of Fredericton, S. G. Hamilton of New Britain, Conn.; Ira H. Hamilton of Brockton, Mass.; T. F. Hamilton of New Jersey, James W. Hamilton of Gagetown, and C. B. Hamilton of St. John; two daughters, Mrs. A. M. Corbett and Mrs. Wm. Reid, both of Summer Hill, Queens county; four brothers, Wm. H. and John Allingham of West St. John, and James and Thomas Allingham of Fredericton, and two sisters, Mrs. William White of Coot Hill, Queens county, and Mrs. William Hamilton of St. John's.

QUESTION OF APPLICATION OF FACTORIES ACT

A case in which a regulation of the factories act of New Brunswick was alleged to have been violated was taken up in the police court this morning and after the evidence was adduced the matter was postponed until Wednesday morning. William J. Morrissey and Harry P. Ross were charged with operating a stationary steam boiler without having a certificate of competency under the factories act. The defendants said that they did not think it necessary as they were employed by the C. N. R. and had certificates issued by the railway. John Kenney, factory inspector, told of going to the C. N. R. power house near the Union Station where he said the defendants told him they were in charge of and operated a boiler having a pressure of from eighty to 120 pounds. The inspector said that persons operating boilers having a pressure above fifteen pounds were required to have a license under the factories act. It was issued by the Workmen's Compensation Board. The defendants produced certificates issued by the railway and also told the court they had been advised by the authorities that the factory inspector had no jurisdiction over them so in view of this had not complied with the demands of the factories act.

LANCASTER TAX ON CITY LANDS

Assessment Increases While Amount of City Holdings Decreases—The 1920 Deficit.

In spite of the fact that the city disposed of \$127,700 worth of its land in the parish of Lancaster in 1919, the taxes levied on the city property in the parish for 1920 were \$758,697 more than for any year in the past, so Commissioners Bullock said this morning. He said that in 1920 the expenditures on city lands in Lancaster amounted to \$4,534, and the receipts were only \$2,833, leaving a deficit of \$1,701.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IS NOT COMING HERE

If His Excellency The Duke of Devonshire, Governor General of Canada were coming to St. John as referred to in a telegram to the mayor last week the visit is now definitely cancelled. On receipt of a wire from the governor's private secretary giving the time of His Excellency's arrival here, but no date, Mayor Schofield wrote to Ottawa asking for further particulars. This morning he received a wire from Captain Balfour, military secretary, saying that the first telegram was delivered in error and asking him to cancel it. It is presumed that the message was intended for St. John's, Quebec, as the Duke of Devonshire was in that vicinity about that time.

STEAMSHIP HERE PASSED THE FLAMING SCHR. FRIEDA E.

The steamer Potima, which arrived in port yesterday from Genoa, passed the four-masted schooner Frieda E., which was burned at sea a few days ago. Captain Scorer, in conversation with a reporter of the Times this morning, said that he received a wireless about 10 o'clock in the morning from a Japanese liner, Kofuku Maru, saying that the schooner was burning and he proceeded to the scene hoping to be able to render assistance. When he arrived about 1 o'clock the vessel was a mass of flames and the crew had been rescued by the Japanese liner, which was bound for Florida. Realizing that the vessel was doomed he proceeded to this port.

THE HOTEL PROJECT

H. R. McLellan, secretary of the Commercial Club, has received a letter from Frank A. Dudley concerning the hotel project. Mr. Dudley writes that building conditions are gathering nearer the point where better results than those of last year may be obtained and his advice is to go ahead with arrangements that the deal may be closed up.

SENT UP FOR TRIAL

The preliminary examination in a case against Arthur J. Davis, Wilfred Warren, Fred Shaffer, Percy Williams, Kenneth S. Selby, Theodore Selby and Frank Williams, was completed this morning before Magistrate Fred M. Sproul, at Hamilton. These men were arrested a short time ago on a charge of stealing from summer cottages and a store in the vicinity of Westfield. Davis had a revolver in his possession when he was searched by the police. They were sent up for trial at the next sitting of the county court. Davis and Frank Williams pleaded guilty to stealing but the other men said nothing.

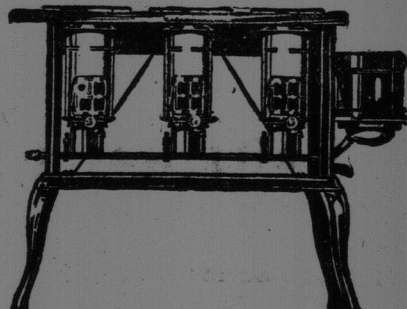
