

HELD IN BAIL OF \$25,000 FOR TRIAL

Indictment in Case of Sale of Poisonous Liqueur Which Caused 100 Deaths.

New York, July 3.—Indicted in connection with the sale of poisonous alcoholic liquors that caused the death of more than 100 persons in the New England States last winter, Samuel K. Sales, Brooklyn druggist, was arraigned in the Kings county court yesterday on charge of manslaughter and was ordered to hold \$25,000 bail for trial next September. Another man also has been indicted and his arrest is expected soon.

LEMBERG IN THE HANDS OF REDS

London, July 3.—The Bolsheviks have captured Lemberg, Ukraine, according to news from Poland, sent by the Daily Mail's correspondent.

Lemberg, which formerly was the capital of Galicia and belonged to Austria, under the delimitation effected by the peace treaty became a part of Ukraine. It is thirty-five miles east of the Ukrainian Polish frontier. The town fell to the Bolsheviks in the partition of Poland in 1912.

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GREEK SUCCESS OVER THE TURKS

Constantinople, July 3.—The Greek occupation of Salonica, city miles north of Smyrna in Asia Minor, after stubborn resistance by the Turks on a line extending eastward, is reported in a Greek communiqué issued under date of July 1.

The Turks are declared to have lost 1,200 prisoners, fifty-four cannons and many munitions and to have suffered many casualties in killed and wounded.

The Greek losses, the communiqué adds, were relatively small.

On the eastern front, a Turkish detachment surrendered to Greek outposts. The capture of Batoukara by the Greeks is the latest in a series of successes.

The Greek forces, the communiqué adds, are advancing along the railway towards the Sea of Marmara.
