New York, Dec. 12—A reign of Bolshevism in the United States to begin at noon on Friday, the 13th, was proclaimed in circulars issued here today by the "People's Day Committee." The "proclamation" cancels "all debts, public and private," repeals "all tes, ordinances and other enactments of capitalistic government," declares at all public offices and directs that the military and naval organizations adiately dissolve" and reorganize themselves "upon a democratic basis for edy demobilization."
