Canadian Boat Won.

Chicago, Aug. 12.—Patricia, the Canadian challenger for the Richardson trophy emblematic of the sailing yacht championship of the Great Lakes, today won the second race of the series of five with Michigan, the American thirty-four footer, in a local regatta. Patricia, a twenty-two footer, having been the victor Saturday. The race was a close one, Patricia was better handled and crossed the finish line in 2:24.20. Michigan's time was 3:23.54.

While the yacht race was being sailed the hydroplane, Baby Reliance, the entry of Commodore Stewart Blackton, of the Motor Boat Club of America in the coming free-for-all motor boat championship race, sank during a trial spin. CHERISHED AMBITIONS

Wants to Retire as Only Undeclared Champion—Anxious to do Something For His Own Race

One day at Las Vegas I asked Jack Johnson if he was responsible for the published statement that he would quit the ring on Labor Day.

"No," said the champion, "not exactly that. I'm going to quit very soon. I'm willing to take on any match ready for me, provided I can make them pay; but I'm not going to fight for the purpose of giving somebody else a reputation or merely to keep my own."

"I haven't barred anybody, white or black, but I'm not going to keep on fighting until Father Time licks me. I've seen others make that mistake and I'm not going to do it. I think it's better and that I can now afford to do. Even if my venture there should fail I still will have enough money invested where it is safe, and the returns on that will keep me from the door of the my family."

May Enter Politics

"I would like to be of some service to the people of my race and with that in view I may enter politics. I live in a district where I think I could be elected to office and my object would be to secure for my people some of the advantages they need, such as schooling, employment, better homes and sanitary conditions. He retains his cleverness and speed, his strength and confidence, and yet there is an indefinable something about him that makes one feel he is not taking the interest in his work he did before, a lack of spirit and vigor that has taken off the keen edge. Still, he remains better than anyone in his class, and if he adheres to his resolution to retire within another year, probably will do so an undefeated champion.
