**ST. JOHN BOYS  
HOME FROM HALIFAX**

**Speak of Stirling's Fine Finish in Road Race—How Stubbs Came Along—Hope to Have Indian Here**

The St. John athletes returned home from Halifax this morning well pleased with what they had accomplished in the sister city. Notwithstanding the good showing that they made they were a little off color.

At the start of the race in front of the Herald building the runners had to wait to be photographed which took up considerable time and had the runners chilled at the start. Stirling took the lead at the start and before the first half mile had been covered he had to give in to cramps which at the time were telling greatly on him. He dropped from the leader at the half mile at the start to 37th, when the 6th mile was reached. He held this position for another mile till he reached the Arm Hill when relief seemed to come and he cut down the lead of no less than ten on the hill. It was plainly seen that he was coming back to old form, and would make it lively before the finish.

When they reached Quinpool Road hill he was twenty-first and was going so well that Halifax sport followers thought that he would overtake the fleet-footed Longboat. When he reached Cornwallis street he was seventeenth and here he passed the favorite from Antigonish, Campbell. From here to the tape he steadily gained ground and passed no less than twelve of the runners in the last mile. In a splendid sprint at the finish he caught his last two men and breasted the tape amidst the cheers of fully 20,000 enthusiastic sport followers who gathered to see the finish of the race.

The St. John boys were treated royally by the Halifax sports. They were taken over the course on Sunday in an auto which was secured by Mr. Dennis, who was the main factor in the race. He also secured the service of an auto, during the race for the accommodation of the St. John runners and every thing was done to treat the St. John boys fair, in every way.

Michael Thomas, the Indian runner is a good one. The St. John boys would like to meet him in St. John in an indoor meet this fall as the Indian is very anxious to meet the St. John team and all hope to have him again.

**KNIGHTS HOME FROM  
NEWFOUNDLAND**

**W. J. Mahoney and Degree Team Had Pleasant Trip—Order Growing There**

After having enjoyed a delightful and successful trip to Newfoundland, W. J. Mahoney, state deputy of the Knights of Columbus, returned yesterday with the local council degree team. Less than a year ago two councils of the order were established in the ancient colony, "Dalton Council" at Harbor Grace, and "Terra Nova Council" at St. John's. Mr. Mahoney's recent visit to the island was to confer the major degree upon a class of forty-five at Harbor Grace, which he did on October 24. A banquet was given on the same evening by the members of Dalton Council to the state deputy and his team.

The following day the major degree was conferred upon a class of sixty-five in St. John's. The members of the council here entertained the visiting knights in fine style; automobiles being placed at their disposal, and they being driven some distance from the city, and tendered another enjoyable banquet. When the visiting team were leaving for their return trip, their island brothers were at the depot in large numbers, gave cheer after cheer as the train steamed away, and many of them accompanied the visitors some distance on the railroad.

State Deputy Mahoney speaks very highly of the treatment accorded him and his degree team while in Newfoundland, and is very much elated with the success and progress of the order in the island. While he was there he appointed a district deputy to represent him, the honor being bestowed on John Farrow, grand knight of Terra Nova Council, in whose person, it is thought, the interests of the order will be well guarded. Mr. Mahoney says that several members from Halifax, Sydney and Montreal councils accompanied the team to Newfoundland, and also that members of the Dalton council went with them to St. John's to attend the exemplification of the degree there.
