## CARPENTIER HAS HAD GOOD LUCK

Fate Has Been Kind to the Frenchman—Is Popular Boxer.

New York, April 23.—(United Press.)—Fortune always has been very kind to Georges Carpentier. The Frenchman has had more good breaks and less bad ones than any other boxer in the game.

After having been stopped by Jack Dempsey and knocked out by the false alarm Siki, Carpentier finds himself a most sought-after boxer instead of a wasted hero.

Promoters are fighting for Carpentier's contract and all of a sudden he again becomes the most talked-of boxer in the country. Carpentier still has color and glamor to him and he is still a great draw.

Recently a smart and experienced promoter was asked to explain what there was about Carpentier, who is only an ordinary fighter, that makes him such a card, and he replied: "He draws the women."

Carpentier, it is almost certain, is coming out of retirement for the primary purpose of making money. He cannot be seeking more glory, as nothing he can do now will erase the defeats by Dempsey and Siki from his record, and he can't hope to defeat any of the American boxers whose names could restore any of his old prestige.

The Frenchman very obviously figures that he can beat Gene Tunney, the American light heavyweight champion, because he wanted to fight Tunney before he meets Tom Gibbons. Carpentier knows that he is figured as being easy by Carpentier and he does not try to deny it.

"When Carpentier was in this country," Tunney says, "I saw the box of Gene Tunney, and I'll agree that it was a terrible thing. It was the worst I ever put up. Carpentier got up about the sixth round, gave me a nasty look and walked out. He became convinced then, I suppose, that he could beat me."

Tunney was the one who blocked the deal when Floyd Fitzsimmons, Chicago promoter, offered Billy Gibbons \$20,000 for the contract. The Frenchman had signed with him. Tunney refused to give up the bout and his reasons show how lucky Carpentier had been compared to some of the other fighters.

"I'm the light heavyweight champion, whatever that means, and I have had a chance to get a thing out of it," Tunney says. "I have had only two 'shots' since I got the title and I worked both times for 12 1/2 per cent. A lot of ordinary fighters get more than that. I want to fight Carpentier because he'll draw a house and I'll get some real money for my end. If I don't get Carpentier before Gibbons, I'll never get him. Tunney is enough to know that Carpentier will not be a card when Gibbons gets through with him."

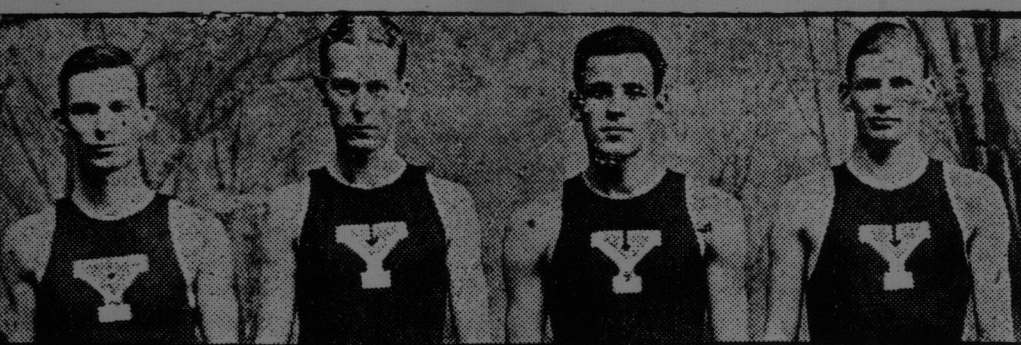
"If Gibbons beat Carpentier and I wanted a match with Gibbons, I'd have to take his terms and it would not be more than another 12 1/2 per cent. If I beat Carpentier I could fight Gibbons on my terms, and I think I would be entitled to it."

"Carpentier had a fortune thrown in his lap and Tunney has to go to all kinds of extremes to get himself some return from his title. He was forced to the expenditure of about \$50,000 out of his own pocket to get Carpentier signed to the articles."

Tom Gibbons, a good, striking example in this country of bad breaks, against Carpentier's good breaks.

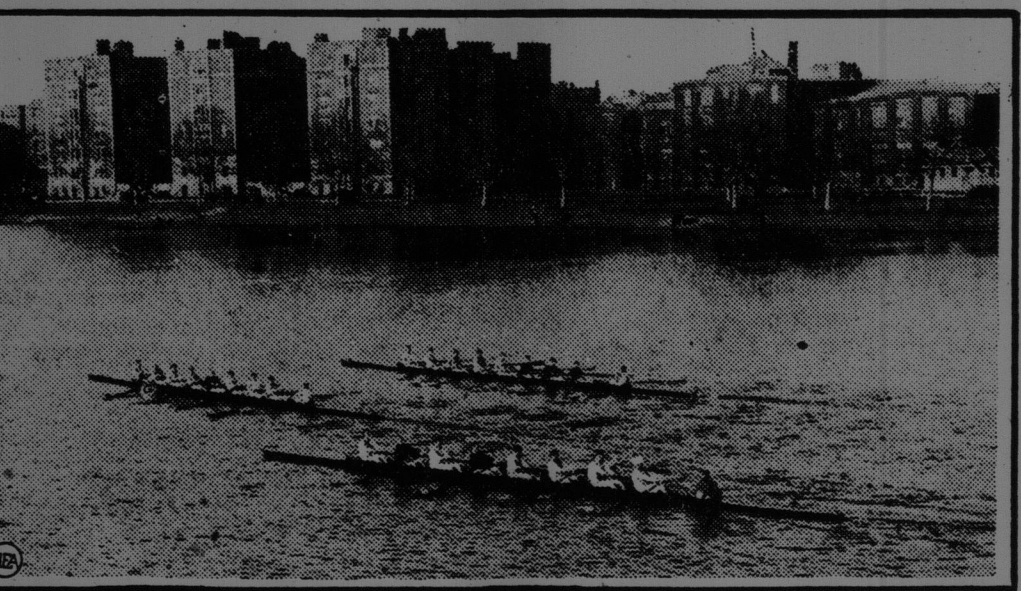
Next to Jack Dempsey, Tom Gibbons is the best card in the country, but he has to go around the provinces

SAYS WAITE HOYT

Pitcher Tom Yankee

To be a successful pitcher one must like his job. The winning pitcher must concentrate on and off the ball field. Many a ball game is won in the clubhouse. Skill practice, the daily conference is called, often paves the way to victory.

In these sessions the weakness and the strength of the opposition is pointed out. No one profits more than the pitcher. Asked to give a definite bit of advice I would say, don't hurry your pitching. Haste creates wildness, very often carelessness.

Study your batter. Dwell on his weakness. Consider every situation of the game and pitch accordingly. Put some thought back of every ball pitched.

One badly pitched ball often loses a game. That has been my sad experience.

The yearling stallion is a bright, attractive colt, stands up well on a nice set of legs and is a small star and a little while on each hind leg. His sire is Peter Potemkin, by the Great, dam Diff. Tved by Tordington. He is a fashionable bred and has the ear marks of a good one.

The mare, Gertrude Todd, is a six years old pacer, brown in color, with a mark of 2:14 1/4, and eligible to the 2:17 class. She has a clean, intelligent looking head, with eyes that stick out like door knobs, and an ear that is working all the time. This mare is very deeply chested, which denotes great breathing capacity, strongly made, all over, and perfect, and her feet and legs are exceptionally good. Her sire is Todd Mac and her dam is Coupon by Equivalent. Just keep your eye on this little lady and see where she lands.

The third horse's name is Billy Directum, a green trotter, four and a half years old. He will do whatever you ask, trot or pace. He is a bright boy, with a large star and a large stripe over his nose, stands about 15 1/2 and made to order all over; one of those rugged and ready little fellows that is always on top. He is by Matta Penn, dam Elizabeth Direct, 2:14 1/2 by Direct Hal, the horse that Ed Geers never was beaten with. This horse has been jogged all winter and is ready to go along with.

These horses act as though they had been handled carefully, as though they are not afraid and their stable manners are perfect. They are certainly a very valuable addition to the Keyes stable and to the list of Down-East horses.

## MORE PROBLEMS BY BILLY EVANS

QUESTIONS.

1. If a ball is fair when it passes over the fence but later goes foul before passing out of the sight of the umpire, is it a home run or merely a foul ball?

2. Can a player be taken out of the game after several balls have been pitched to him and a pinch hitter substituted?

3. When two runners are standing on the base, to whom does the base belong?

4. Can a batsman take first base when hit by a slowly pitched ball?

5. If a fielder drop a fly ball but the batsman is finally retired, is the fielder charged with an error?

ANSWERS.

1. The umpire judges a hit over the fence fair or foul according to its position when it finally passes from his view.

2. A batsman can be removed at any time in favor of a substitute hitter. The substitute simply taking the ball and strike count on the original batter.

3. A base always belongs to its original occupant unless he is forced to vacate.

4. The speed of a pitched ball is given no consideration when a batsman is hit. The question of the ball going first depends on whether or not the umpire believed he tried to avoid the pitch.

5. The fielder is charged with an error though the batsman is finally retired.

## HOKEY CLUB GETS WIDENER STALLION

French Sire, Maintenant, Received by Breeding Bureau—A Thoroughbred.

New York, April 23.—Joseph E. Widener of Philadelphia has presented the French sire, Maintenant, now at his Elmsford Stud, near Lexington, Ky., to the Breeding Bureau of the Jockey Club. Frank K. Sturgis, chairman of the Breeding Bureau, will probably send the horse to Hillandale Farm, near Manassas, in this State, where he will be in charge of the State Constabulary.

Maintenant is a splendid big son of the renowned French horse, Maintenant, for many years the premier sire at Haras du Quessay, the palatial stud of the late William K. Vanderbilt in France, but now the property of A. K. Macomber. The dam of Maintenant was Martha Gorman, by Sir Dixon owned by Sallie McClellan. She was bred in this country and is a sister to the biggest thoroughbred in the country, standing almost seventeen hands. Unlike many big horses he is full of quality. William K. Vanderbilt, among the number being Great Luck, Lally, Modesty, Anonymous and Whirligig.

If he goes to Hillandale Farm he will be the third thoroughbred sire in the care of Sergeant Boice of the State Constabulary, whose horse breeding activities were transferred to that point after the destruction of the baroness of Greedy Farm on one side and the Spear Point, by Spearpoint, recently donated by William Woodward of the Belair Stud, and Cock of the North, which was presented to the Breeding Bureau by Mrs. Payne Whitney, are the horses that will share stud honors with Maintenant in his new home.
