# TORONTO GIRLS SMASH THREE WORLD RECORDS IN TRACK MEET

## ROSE GOSSE IS STAR ATHLETE AT QUEEN'S PARK

New Marks Set in 100 and 220 Yard Dashes, Also Relay Race

LONDON, Ont., Aug. 4.—Three world records were shattered at the girls' international track and field meet at Queen's Park yesterday under the auspices of the London Centennial Sports Committee.

Rose Gosse, of Toronto, established new records in the 100 and 220 yard dashes. In the former event, she ran the distance in 11 seconds, nipping a fifth of a second off the record she herself established in the 220 yard dash. Miss Gosse made the distance in 25.15 seconds also taking a fifth of a second off the previous record.

The Canadian Women's Athletic Club track team won the international relay championship, the team being composed of Tony Conacher, Ethel Smith, Kay Flannigan and Myrtle Cook. This team ran a wonderful race against the Toronto and set a new relay record of 50.8 seconds. The former record established by the Toronto at the United States National meet was 51 seconds.

W. Maddison, Moncton, 108 gross, and 89 net. The other players to qualify for the first round were all Nova Scotians.

In the first round of the championships tomorrow, Miss McLeod meets Mrs. W. T. Allen, Brightwood, and Mrs. Addison will play Miss Edith Bauld, Ashburn, present Maritime titleholder, who led the field of 46 today with a score of 98.

In the driving competition, Miss McLeod came second with a total of 431 yards for three drives, the winner being Mrs. W. H. Ross, New Glasgow, 450 yards.

In the approaching and putting competition, four holes, Mrs. W. K. McKean, Ashburn, formerly of Saint John, came first with 11 strokes. Mrs. Maddison, Moncton, was second with 12.

Until this year, the batsman on such a play would have been entitled to only three bases. The original rule gave him that many when a thrown glove came into contact with a batted ball. The ball became dead.

Under the new rule of this year, the batsman is entitled to not only three bases but the extra base if he can make it.

Therefore, in the play, cited, the batsman who reached home on a play in which the fielder's glove was thrown at the ball and came into contact with it, is entitled to score.

### HAS WON NINE RACES IN FIVE MEETS SO FAR

FREDERICTON, N. B., August 4.—Joe Johnson, of Portland, Me., is the leading driver on the Maine and New Brunswick Circuit to date, having won nine races and having taken purse money amounting to \$4,150 in the five meetings that have taken place so far.

Starting with the opening meeting at Caribou, Me., where he won five races, Johnson got off to a flying start and he has never been caught. Of late, however, he has not ridden in front so often, his only win at the Fredericton Driving and Sporting Club's meeting last week being with Hal Mahone, 2:01, in the Free-for-all; but that was worth several less important events from more standpoints than one.

Pressing Johnson closely for the honors of leading reinsman of the circuit is Will Utton, of Barton, Vt., who won eight races in eleven starts with a small stable from the Rising Brook Stables, having the leading consecutive winning horse of the Circuit in Lambert Todd, 2:02 3/4, which won four junior free-for-alls in as many starts.

Utton might have had a couple more wins had he not preferred to keep a couple of his stars in the barn rather than take fast winrace records with them here last week. Utton's purse winnings reached \$2,200 for four meetings.

Occupying third place in amount of winnings is "Red" Hanafin, who has been successful as a "catch" driver when not piloting members of his own stable. His winnings total \$2,020, and he has won four races, two of them with horses not of his own stable.
