## FINED \$8 FOR DESTRUCTION IN CITY PARK

**Court Severe in Matter in  
Case of Charles  
Harvey**

Charles Harvey, arrested last evening on a charge of destroying flowers in King Square and allowed out on a deposit of \$8, appeared before Magistrate Henderson in the Police Court this morning, was severely reprimanded by the magistrate and fined \$8. The magistrate said that it was due to a misunderstanding that Harvey had been allowed out on an \$8 deposit, as the offence was a serious one and a deposit of at least \$25 should be made in such cases. Where wilful destruction took place, no freedom on deposit should be permitted.

The magistrate spoke very strongly against destroying flowers and shrubbery in the public parks and said that for wilful destruction a penalty of five years' imprisonment could be imposed. As Harvey had been ill and started working only recently, a fine of only \$8 was imposed, but Magistrate Henderson said that in the next case of a like nature brought before him he would carry out the law to its fullest extent.

He wished the public to take notice of the fact that the only place to walk while in the squares was on the paths and that it was a violation of the law to walk on the grass.

At high tide the water of the Bay of Fundy reaches a higher level than the water of the Saint John River and forces its way through the gorge of the Falls, creating a "Falls" running up river.  
At low tide the water in the Bay becomes so much lower than that of the river, that the fall of water is reversed and flows down river into the Bay.

At half tide, when the level in the Bay and River are about equal, the Falls disappear entirely, and the water at the Falls flows smoothly as the surface of a lake.  
To fully appreciate this wonder of the world it should be seen at all three stages.

## FINDS BOY HIT BY AUTOMOBILE IS HIS OWN SON

**Particulars of Killing of Jerome Kent in Boston Received**

In reporting the fatal auto accident in which Jerome Kent, a former Saint John boy met his death in Boston, referred to in The Times-Star yesterday, the Boston Post of Monday published the following:  
"Dennis Kent of 9 East College street picked up a dying boy in front of his home at 8:30 Sunday night, to be informed by his hysterical wife that it was his son Jerome, aged four, who had been struck by an auto operated by Lawrence E. Donlan, 46 of 60 Lockstead street, Jamaica Plain. The boy died 10 minutes after entering City Hospital, from a fracture of the skull. Donlan was arrested on a charge of manslaughter.

The child was playing in the street when Donlan's machine turned into the road from Dudley street. Donlan after the car struck the boy went a distance of 75 feet before the yells of Stephen Navick of 17 East Cottage street brought him to a halt, according to the police. The boy's mother and father were sitting on the doorstep of their home. The father says he was attracted to the accident by the noise of the auto hitting his son, and he failed to recognize the bleeding and crushed victim as his own boy.

The lad, as stated yesterday, was a nephew of Frank Garnett, Saint John speed skater.
