Belfast, Sept. 25.—A conference of Unionist leaders was held today when resolutions were adopted declaring that the Unionists would not acknowledge the authority of any home rule government. A committee was appointed to devise a provisional government for Ulster which should be operative on the day that the Irish Home Rule bill was passed. Sir Edward Carson, member of parliament for Dublin University, was chosen for leader of the movement.

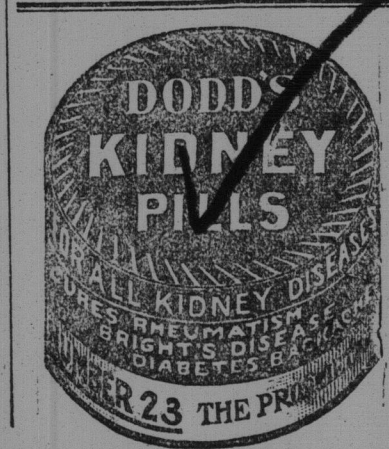
