

## When Clemenceau Said "I Make War"

(From Victor Giraud's "Histoire de la Grande Guerre.")

Clemenceau, then seventy-six years old, was alert, vigorous, industrious and as full of light as a man of twenty. He had already been in public life for nearly half a century. He had had a stormy, troubled career in which error, injustice, inconsistency and contradiction had abounded. Indeed, had his career terminated in October, 1917, impartial history would have been quite severe in its appreciation of it. He has all the faults and almost all the characteristics of French temperament. He is nervous, impulsive, gruff, authoritative, thoroughly disrespectful and quite distrustful with individualism and the critical spirit. He is utterly incapable of holding back those vivacious, intellectual and at times cruel sallies that spring forth from his inexhaustible and invincible fancy. He is more of an orator than a writer and more of a conversationalist than an orator. But he is first, last and always a master of polemics and a man of action. He has been familiarly called "The Tiger." Well, his brusque and snappish air, his indescribable and unforgettable

mustache, his bushy eyebrows, his fiery black eyes, his great square jaws ready to murder at a moment's instigation; in short, his entire external appearance, bespeaking as it does the veteran grouch, hardly places us in a position to claim that the appellation is unhappy. He is a Jacobin, but a Jacobin who is a patriot. He is the sole survivor of that group of men who protested in the national assembly along with Victor Hugo against the giving up of Alsace-Lorraine. He hates Germany by instinct and experience, and his hatred is old, robust, vigilant and tenacious. He has belonged to the opposition for more than forty years because it is in his nature to criticise and to fight. He is a born demolisher. It is no longer possible to count the ministers he has overthrown. There is no doubt that he went into training without knowing it, to overthrow the German and Austrian empires. As soon as Austria and Germany declared war on us all his activity as a journalist and a politician had but one, though a double, end in view. He wanted to discover the best means of defeating Germany and rise to power so that he himself could preside at the execution of vengeance. And in this indispensable work of justice and reparation, for which his very nature and his eventual past especially fitted him, he manifested at all times a youthful ardor, an unselfishness and a vigor of will power which will in themselves constitute forever his moral justification.

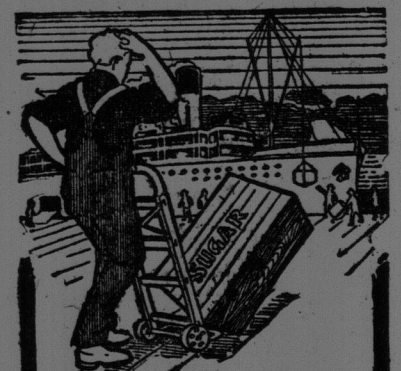
All France understands this perfectly. Even those who—beginning with President Poincaré himself—had a host of grievances against Clemenceau suddenly forgot everything and voiced their confidence in him. Everybody felt that "the old man from Vendée" who loved his native country so passionately would be equal in every way to his great task and that he would be able to make short work of the enemy within and without. It was impossible for any one to associate weakness or compromise with his programme. Everybody felt that Clemenceau would be l'homme de la guerre to the very end.

It was a wonderful sight to see France forging its way to victory under Georges Clemenceau. But he who loves to talk keeps silent. He works. He goes to the Chamber of Deputies just as rarely as possible. He works. He confers with Foch, whom he knows quite well and whom he "discovered" only the other day. He confers with Pétain and with the various ministers. He pushes the war. He calls forth a question and settles it with a decisiveness for which he would order the world over. He gets in touch with the ministers of the Allies and tells them precisely what he feels France should have, and gets it, for, as Lloyd George has said: "It is a difficult matter to refuse Clemenceau anything he asks for."

In his rare hours of leisure he goes to the front as a peon. He takes a cane, wears leggings, a baggy suit and slouch hat pulled down to his ears. His best moments are not those which he spends at headquarters, but those in the trenches. He associates with the soldiers. For some reason or other he prefers to be with the private, second class. He talks in a familiar way with them, jokes with them; he is like a father. His humor, for he has that, too, comes into full play. He sets the fellows an example in fearlessness, tenacity and courage. Stealing away from his guide, he goes to the very spot where the danger is greatest, risking without hesitation a life so precious to France.

The poilus love to receive visits from the old man who has become a tradition. They like to hear him talk, for he speaks the language they understand. What he says is simple, graceful, kindly. The vitality of their old chief inspires them. His soul, so steely and French, is the sister of their souls. It was not by chance that they gave to him the surname: Le père la Victoire.

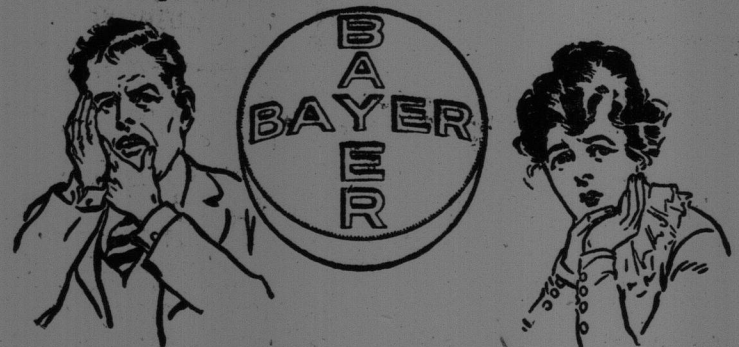

Robert Crawford, provincial constable, has spent a busy week-end rounding up speeding automobiles and automobiles with faulty lights or without lights at night. On the Westfield road on Sunday three cars were held up for speeding, military car, 221; and cars 8,027 and 8,219. These cases will come before Magistrate Dalton in the course of the next few days. 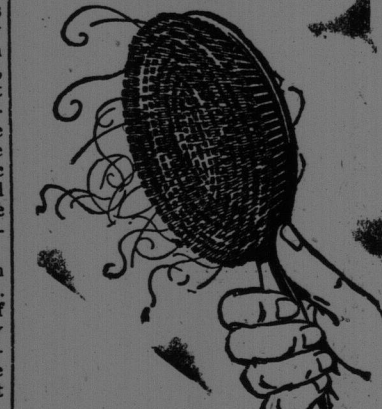
