New York, March 16.—Expressing the belief that an aerial navy will be a step in the final conquest of war, Hud-son Maxim, inventor of explosives and son Maxim, inventor of explosives and first maker of smokeless powder in this country, speaking on Saturday night at the second annual banquet of the Aero club of New York at the St. Regis, declared that we must have armaments in order to enforce international law and that we need a stronger navy. Mr. Maxim surprised his auditors by declaring that the Japanese had recently purchased of a steel company at Newark, N. J. 3,000 tons of rifle barriels, "rifles enough to arm 750,000 men." Most of the rifles, the speaker stated, were in the hands of the Japanese troops.
