The fighting at Kip River Sunday reported from Pretoria was personally General French and General Buller.

THE WAR! LONDON, May 28, 2.13 p.m.—Although the federals are said to be preparing for strong resistance at the Kip River, those who have most closely followed the progress of the war since the British and Boer armies came in touch at Brandfontein are very sceptical as to the burghers seriously disputing Lord Roberts' advance.

THE WAR! LONDON, May 28.—Address received here says that supplies continue to go to the Boers from Lorenzo Marques and that foreign recruits for the Boer army proceed from the same place.

THE WAR! LONDON, May 28.—It is removed here that General French has entered Johannesburg. The London Times prints four columns of mail correspondence from Bloemfontein based upon original documents, official correspondence not readily accessible.

THE WAR! LONDON, May 29.—The Globe's special cable says: London, May 29.—Lady Sarah Wilson in today's London Daily Mail says: "It is impossible to express the delight of the town at seeing the fine royal horse Canadian artillery gallop gallantly into action after their marvellous march of three hundred miles in 12 days. Their accuracy in shelling the Boer laager was marvellous. They cleared the Boer encampment in twenty minutes."

THE WAR! LONDON, May 29, 2 p.m.—The tenor of Lord Roberts' despatch of last night and the news from Pretoria this morning leads the authorities here to expect early further important news from the British commander-in-chief, dated they hope from Johannesburg. The remarkable rapidity of Lord Roberts' movements and the unaccountable mobility of the whole British army under his hand have again the calculations of the home observers as much as

they appear to have disconnected and demoralized Lord Roberts' federal opponent. Possibly, even now, as at the end of Johannesburg and, it is believed, ten days hence or less he ought to be demanding admittance to the Transvaal capital itself. If the federals ever really intended to "stagger humbly" by blowing up the gold reef city and mines, which is doubted, Lord Roberts may yet be too quick for them and arrive before they have time to do any wracking. The majority of the burghers will undoubtedly be glad of an excuse for saving the mines and they may find the excuse in Lord Roberts' skill in battling them out of one position after another. The effectiveness of the British invasion of the Transvaal is further emphasized by the news from Pretoria of the occupation of Zwart and the advance on Lichtenburg. Apparently the British dragoon will be drawn through the Transvaal as it was in a similar manner held through the Free State.

THE WAR! LONDON, May 28.—The Free State was formally annexed to-day. Lord Roberts yesterday announced to his troops the annexation of the Free State, which hereafter will be called the "Orange River State." It is rumored here that Gen. French has ordered the Boer communications between Heidelberg and Bokburg, within a few miles of Johannesburg.

THE WAR! LONDON, May 28.—The Boers, after preparing a good position, fled rapidly. The train leaving their last detachment was nearly captured by Pakenburg's West Australians. Prisoners taken state that there was no intention of blowing up the mines, declaring that the threat was made simply with the intention of frightening away the burghers. The British advance force is now within fifteen miles of Johannesburg.

THE WAR! LONDON, May 28.—The British occupied Zwart this morning and a large force is marching on to Lichtenburg. An official bulletin states that the British crossed the Vaal River Saturday. Gen. Lemmer had a severe fight at Kip River. Five of the burghers were wounded and two were captured. The British were five thousand strong.

THE WAR! LONDON, May 28.—The British guns at Ingogo have been heavily bombarding the Boer position since daylight. The Boer guns have replied incessantly. About the Canadians. At the Empire Day celebration in Halifax General Lord Roberts was invited to go to the Boer's Majesties in Canada and in the course of a speech at one of the schools.
