H. F. McLaughlin, M. P. P., of Re-

sistance, entirely agreed with the resolu-

tion, and said it was an auspicious occasion

when the Liberal party headed by Laurier

took power and began the grand career

which had marked it up to the present.

He spoke of Canada's prosperity and of

the bright future in store for it.

Hon. L. J. Treadwell was received with

great cheering. He congratulated Hon.

H. R. Emerson on his appointment,

and wished him every success. Politically

and generally Mr. Treadwell was with him

every time. He said he (Treadwell) was

no Conservative, and no Liberal—a kind

of Liberalite. He didn't come to make

any declaration of political faith, but

the present government was good enough for

him. He praised Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and

said no one not prejudiced could deny

that the policy of the government had

been beneficial to the dominion. Mr.

Treadwell assured Mr. Emerson that he

had the sympathy and support of right-

thinking ability of the provincial government

behind him. (Cheers.) As to the St. John

election, he said it was to St. John's

credit to ask government assistance and

to ask an opposition man to parliament

he felt no doubt of the election of Mr.

McKenna, and asked of the value of

ward work. Mr. Treadwell thought there

was a good time in store for New Brun-

swick. He said he would not be apathy, nor

over-confidence. Every effort must be

made to win the next, not merely by a

majority, but by a majority as large as

it can be made.

But work is required elsewhere as well

as in St. John. Parliament must be

prepared for the general elections. He

would like to see vigorous Liberal

members from this province, and there

was no reason why, with enthusiastic

work, that hope could not be realized.

He said that while men might have

been selected in his place in the cabinet

no man could be chosen who would be

more sincerely desirous of serving the

Liberal party—which means the doing

of good for the country. He asked for

the trust and forbearance of his fellow

Liberals, and said he would do his best

to retain their confidence.

The election of provincial officers was

announced with the following results:

President: Hon. G. G. King.

Vice-pres: Richard O'Brien, St. John.

Second Vice President: F. B. Carvell, Woodstock.

Third Vice President: Dr. E. T. Gaudet, Doaktown.

Secretary: O. J. Milligan, St. John.

Treasurer: Geo. McArthur, St. John.

A long discussion took place over the

mode of selecting the executive committee,

and finally a nominating committee

of five was appointed.

Messrs. R. O'Brien, O. Targuen, M. P.

P. F. B. Carvell were appointed a

committee on resolution approving of the

government's policy.

Senator Thompson, W. S. Loug, M. P.

P. P., and Mr. McArthur (Doaktown)

were appointed a committee to prepare a

resolution endorsing the selection of Mr.

Emerson as minister of railways.

The foregoing session then adjourned.

At the afternoon session there was

another large attendance and a resolution

endorsing the policy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier

was unanimously carried.

Mr. Targuen, after dealing with general

business, spoke of the following Tuesday's

election in St. John and said the eyes of

all New Brunswick Liberals would be on

the result. He spoke highly of Hon. Mr.

Emerson and his right to the place he

occupied in the cabinet. He suggested

Sir Wilfrid Laurier as one who a year

ago had been elected as one of the

greatest statesmen of the empire, and

said that Mr. Emerson had such a

future before him.

John Morley, M. P., of Newcastle,

was loudly cheered. He referred to his

understanding at his call upon him, but

said he could never tell what he can do

for his country. He said he had been

elected to the position of Liberal (opposite)

and Conservative (now, here), and a young

man in the country could be that he made

himself. He said all New Brunswick

felt that no man could command the loyal

support of a people as Mr. Emerson.

(Cheers.) He said there was an apathy

in the country. He didn't have a man called

a Liberal as he came to town, and there

should be more fight. He hoped to see

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
