WOMAN AND CHILD FELL—BAD STREET.

The Free Baptist church and Albert street, strange to say, the other sections of this much-used highway are as good as grace any part of the city and better than most streets.

C. P. R. FREIGHT RATES.

Recent Readjustments in Freight Rates by Some City Merchants.

Many city wholesale dealers contend that they are materially affected by a readjustment of the C. P. R. freight rates, which took effect about the first of July. This new arrangement brings in an increase in the freight rates of several classes of goods, while in others it is somewhat lower.

The C. P. R. say that it is simply a readjustment of their tariff to a mileage system, which applies to all lines of the C. P. R. east of Fort Arthur. It not only makes their freight system much less complicated and satisfactory, but it does not, to any great extent, increase the rates on the whole.

Importers of certain kinds of goods are benefited by the change. For instance, the rates on goods which come under the first and second classes, such as very light groceries and hardware, and most lines of dry goods, are lower than they were before. On the other hand those goods which are of the fourth or fifth class, such as the heavy lines of hardware and groceries, are carried at a higher rate.

Local dealers claim that the increase does not amount to so much west of Montreal. This is probably due to the fact that there is more competition there owing to the water routes, etc. They say that the increase is particularly marked in St. John rates, on the same class of goods, over the rates charged for the same distance west of Montreal, which they believe proves that the new arrangement does not affect all lines east of Port Arthur as claimed by the railway.

WATER AND SEWERAGE.

Ald. Christie After the Newspapers
—Engineer Will Enquire Into Route of New Main.

A meeting of the water and sewerage board was held yesterday afternoon. Those present were: His Worship the Mayor, chairman; Ald. Holder, Tilley, Brannen, Maxwell, Macrae, Christie, Hann, Frink and Carleton.

The meeting was called to receive tenders for printing Barbour's report. The only tender submitted was from the Telegraph Publishing Co., which submitted tenders for printing 600 copies of reports at 80c. a page for 10-point type leaded, \$1 a page for 6-point type leaded, and four maps printed and inserted at back of report, \$45. The tender was accepted.

Applications for the farm at Silver Falls were received from Joseph Perkins and Jas. Speigh.

Moved by Ald. Hann that James Speigh's tender be accepted, provided he give good security. The application from Mr. Speigh is for a term of five years, for which he agrees to give \$12 for the balance of this year, and \$10 a year beginning May 1st, 1905, providing the water is put into the house. He will be allowed water for his own family use.

A bill for water main pipe for the Partridge Island main was submitted by W. H. Thorne & Co., Ltd. Three-quarters of the amount is to be paid by the dominion government, but according to the agreement the city must assume the running expenses and be reimbursed each month by the government for its share of the expense. About 300 or 400 feet have already been laid since the work was begun two weeks ago.

Fear was expressed by some of the aldermen that if the city paid up it might be some time before the money was handed back.

Ald. Maxwell moved, seconded by Ald. Hann, that the money be borrowed by a temporary loan to pay the amount due.

Ald. Carleton wished to explain a matter relating to the sewerage on Union street, and his appearance before the police magistrate in connection with the sewerage matter should be put in, and moved that the prayer of the petitioners on Union street be granted.

Ald. Christie thought that in view of the recent expenditures no more money should be expended on the sewerage. The motion was carried.

Exhibition Management Doing Their Best to Crowd in a Few More Exhibits.


There are more applications now in for space in the exhibition buildings than have been received for any previous exhibition. More than this, there are more than room can be found for, and the management are hustling to accommodate all those concerns who wish to make a display.

Every inch of space in the big buildings has been taken up on both upper and lower floors, and there are now on hand sixteen or perhaps seventeen applications from important and well known firms who desire space. MOUNT ALLISON JUBILEE.

This Day Fifty Years Ago the Institution was First Opened to Students.

The main Ladies' College building is in gala attire today, for on this day, August 19, fifty years ago, its doors were first thrown open for the reception of students. It was the first of the Ladies' Colleges in the maritime provinces, and young women who had been longing for just such advantages for advanced study came thronging to a building scarce one third the size of the present structure. Yet at the close of the first year over 100 students had been registered.

The jubilee is to be formally celebrated on the fourth and fifth of next October, for nearly two years the Alumnae Society has been working on a card catalogue of all the Ladies' College students during the fifty years. This catalogue is rapidly approaching completion. Especial endeavors have been made to procure and record the address of every student who is still living.

Each old student will receive an invitation to be in Sackville, the guest of the Alumnae Society, on the above named days, and it is hoped that a most enjoyable reunion will result. The programme prepared for the occasion will be announced very shortly.
