

did collection of apples which scored 70 points more than No. 4, and 123 more than No. 3, last year's winner. In grapes also Grand Forks had a lead of 11 more than No. 4 and 1 more than No. 3; in everything else it was behind. In plums it was badly beaten by No. 4, which scored 33 points more than it did. On the other hand it had a lead of 44 points over No. 3. No. 4's strong point was plums and No. 3 had both its competitor beaten in pears, crab apples and peaches.

The success of Grand Forks was no surprise, the surprise being the wonderful display made by the south side of the Arm. Popularly the south side is not supposed to be as good as the north and as a matter of fact it has less land, except at the Proctor and and moreover has been less settled. The record made this year is some token of what has been accomplished in the last two or three years on the south side.

The other districts made no exhibit, which is a pity as visitors to the fair from the prairies naturally went away with the impression that the districts represented were the only districts which grew fruit to any extent. This is a pity as the Kasko district, that around Trail and along the Arrow lakes are rapidly growing in importance and could make a fine exhibit and, as Kasko showed last year, have a good opportunity of winning the prize. The strongest district is possibly the north side of the Arm, but this year, nevertheless, as the result has shown, it was beaten by two rivals.

#### MORE TO COME

Writ out for C. P. R. Conductor for Assaulting Bunyan  
Yesterday a warrant was sworn out against William Jewell, C.P.R. conductor, charging him with assaulting Jack Bunyan the previous evening. Jewell went over to Ehoit in the morning on his regular run and will either be served there or upon his return to the city. The warrant is brought into the general tangle which is exciting so much local comment, he being charged with aiding Jewell.

When the Bunyan-Jewell case comes up it is estimated that the whole matter will be gone into from start to finish. Only a portion of the facts have so far been made public and it is believed now that facts, which should have been before the police commissioners, had the officials gone carefully into matters, will now be placed on record, as the assault on Friday evening is said to be merely one incident in a long series of events.

The whole affair is said to date back to a card game in the Hume hotel last Monday night. Several minor incidents are said to have happened, which should make interesting reading when they are published; and then follow the events of last Wednesday night and early Thursday morning, a portion of which have already been published. Now all details are promised, either in court or falling that, in the press.
