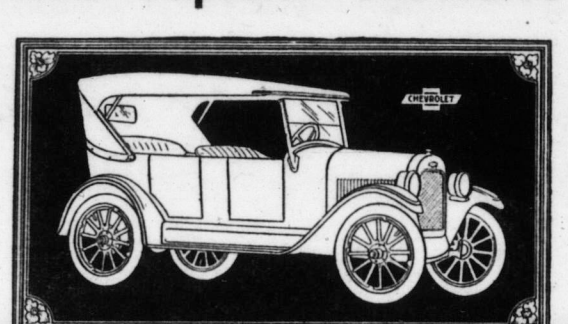

H. A. Percy, a former Alvinston boy, died in Toronto on June 14th. Alvinston civic holiday will be held on Wednesday September 22nd.

Bowmanville is now a one-paper town, the News having been incorporated with the Canadian Statesman.

The death occurred at Elton, Mich., of Mrs. Catherine Wing, an old Aldborough resident, in her 88th year.

Dutton high school teachers have resigned, with the exception of Principal Elliott, who is remaining for the next year.

Mrs. Charles Metzer, aged 68 years, died at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. McCann, north of Dutton, last week.

Mrs. Mary J. McCallum, who was born in Aldborough, died at her home in Iona Station on Monday last, in her 55th year.

Lightning last Thursday struck an underground grease tank at the Petrolia refinery, causing a fire department extinguished the flames.

L. Lenover, of Howard, states that among a number of young white Leghorn chicks hatched at his place, there was one chick with four legs and four feet.

A defective chimney caused the roof of the kitchen of Harry Richards' residence at Bothwell to catch fire last Thursday morning. The prompt response of the firemen saved the house from being consumed.

This year's strawberry crop is going to be smaller than that of last season by thousands of boxes, according to the opinion of growers in Kent county. A large percentage of the crop has been "winter killed" as the result of conditions existing during the past winter.

A toy balloon was picked up one day last week on a farm near Forest, to which a note was attached stating that it had been released from the Agricultural College at Lansing, Mich., on March 25th. The balloon was filled with some kind of gas and was evidently used for experimental purposes.
