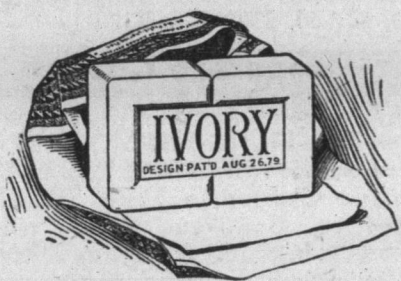

W.D. Euler M.P. Would Have Cabinet Ministers

Members of House of
Commons.

FAVORS ABOLITION OF
SENATE

At the evening sitting, Mr. William
D. Euler, introduced his resolution to
the effect that all Ministers of the
Crown should be members of the House
of Commons or become such within a
period of three months after their ap-
pointment to the Cabinet.

In supporting his resolution, Mr.
Euler said the basic reason for the
resolution was that members of the
Senate not being elected, were not re-
sponsible to the people, and should
therefore be barred from the Cabinet.
He would support a resolution provid-
ing for the abolition of the Senate if
such were introduced.

A non-elective Senate in these times
said Mr. Euler, was assuredly some-
what of an anomaly. As a matter of
fact it was lately becoming more or less
of a divorce court. Men were re-warded
with seats in the Senate for services
rendered to their party. There were
now three Senators in the Dominion
Cabinet. One of those the leader of
the Senate (Sir James Loughheed) was
also head of the Department of Soldiers
Civil Re-establishment. Question of
importance in connection with this de-
partment were constantly coming be-
fore the House of Commons and in the
opinion of Mr. Euler the Minister
should be present to answer them.
Another member of the Cabinet who
occupied a seat in the Senate was Hon.
G.D. Robertson, Minister of Labor.

It was important at this present time
of unrest that the Labor Department
be represented in the Commons.

The most glaring instance, however
of a violation of the principle of respon-
sible government arose in the case of
the Postmaster-General. He was a
man who had been overwhelmingly de-
feated in two constituencies, and there-
fore manifestly did not possess the con-
fidence of the people. In spite of these
facts he had been placed in charge of a
department employing ten thousand
men and involving a huge expenditure.
The appointments of Mr. Blondin, said
Mr. Euler was an arrogant defiance of
the will of the people.

Sir Thomas White who followed Mr.
Euler said that in listening to the pre-
vious speech he had been impressed by
his failure to appreciate the constitution
of Canada as it is to-day. It was a
debatable point as to whether or not the
Senate should be an elective or appoint-
ed body. But that was not the ques-
tion before the House. The British
North America Act which was a con-
tract provided that the Upper House
should have co-ordinate legislative au-
thority with the Commons save in mat-
ters pertaining to money and the levy of
taxes.

Sir Thomas said that in his opinion
the representation of the Govern-ment in
the Senate should be of a limited nature
in comparison with its representation
in the Commons but it was essential
that the Government be represented in
the Upper House. Previous adminis-
trations gave ample authority for two
or three members of the Government
having seats in the Senate and the ad-
ministration of Sir Wilfrid Laurier had
increased rather than decreased the
Senate representation in the Cabinet.

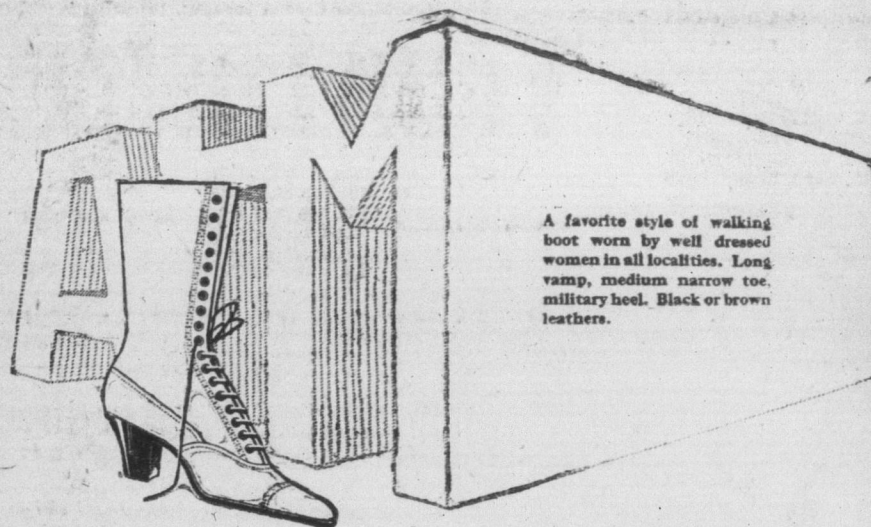

in wages.

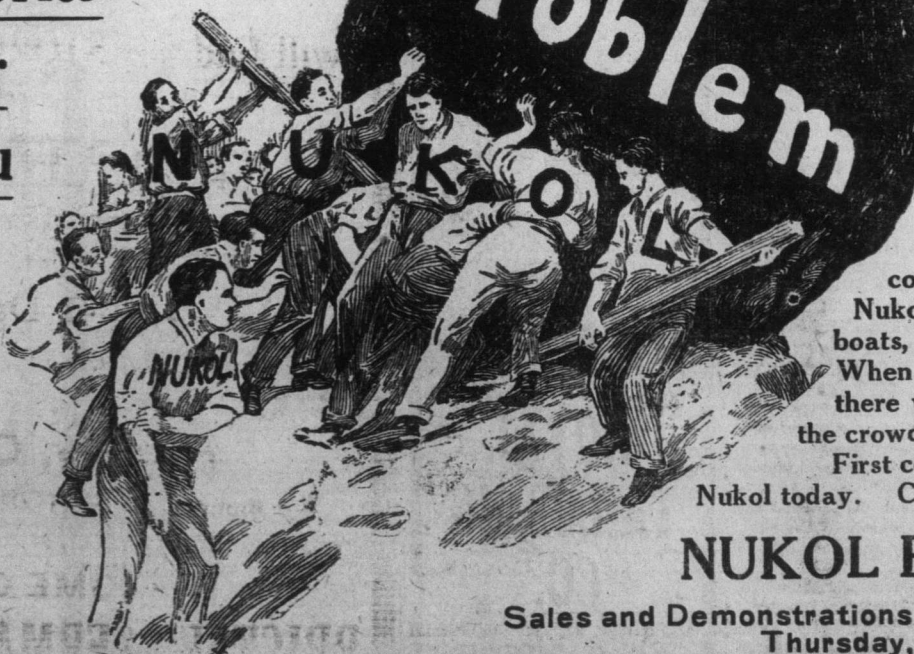
