MONTREAL TEXTILE WORKERS STRIKE

Montreal, May 17.—The strike of the loomfixers in the Hochelaga and Mount Royal mills of the Dominion Textile Company is still in an unsettled condition, and according to the strike leaders, is likely to become general if a settlement is not reached before Tuesday or Wednesday of next week. According to the loomfixers, the men this morning, the entire weaving department at the Hochelaga mill is closed down and without the weavers the other departments cannot continue for any length of time. At the Royal mill only three hundred looms out of fifteen hundred are working, the men say, while at the St. Anne's mill the work of the weaving department is seriously interfered with.

RUSH CONSTRUCTION HUDSON BAY RY.

Lepas, Man., May 17.—After thirty-seven years of agitation and expectation on the part of the people of Western Canada, one mile of the Hudson Bay Railway was completed yesterday, when the J. D. McArthur Co. engine No. 15 finally crossed the Saskatchewan, driving before it the rail laying machine and hauling a car of material.
With five hundred men now busy on the first portion of the road, almost half of it should be completed this year.

HOPE TO HARNESS **SCIENCE MADE TO**
TIDES FOR POWER **WITHHOLD DEATH**

Locomotives May be Driven, Cities Lighted, and Houses Warmed by Ocean.
By It Every Function of Body, Save Consciousness, Can be Kept Up.

London, May 18.—Will the harnessing of tides—the ageing dream of scientists the world over—be realized at last? Mr. C. A. Battiscombe, M. S. E., believes that it will, and in an interview conjured up a wonderful vision of the future, when locomotives will be driven, cities lighted, households warmed, and meals cooked—all by tidal power.
"After a close study of the subject for more than two years," he said, "I am of the opinion that the use of the tides for power of all sorts may now be placed on a strictly commercial basis. An electrical unit might be obtained by this means at a cost about one-sixteenth under the power systems now in use."
"The tidal proposal is not so revolutionary after all. I wonder how many people realize the use to which this tidal power is put every day of the year in propelling ships, and in the case of tidal basins in raising vessels of enormous tonnage."
"The installation would not be at all complicated and would follow the lines of three practical patents taken out by a German for combined reservoirs and supply chambers."
"The main difficulty today turns on the question of the embankment walls. Can they be formed sufficiently economically to make such installation a practical success. The use of a ferro concrete 'skin' the inner parts of which are formed by cheaper materials, in my opinion, solves this difficulty."
"There are a number of places on the west coast of England that are excellently adapted for central tidal stations, and sub-stations might be established at, say, fifty mile intervals. A number of rivers might equally be adapted to the purpose, with, of course, suitable locks."
