The moment she is seen, the sentinels within and around the Royal Palace are at once doubled. ## EMPLOYED IN THE EAST .....

From the days of Osymandyas, of Egypt, the first warlike king, who carried fire and sword into Asia two thousand one hundred years before the time of Christ, down to the present conflict in Manchuria, the governing sentiment has been. "All is fair in love and war." True, civilization has brought with it a modification of this seatiment, but it has also brought more cunning and more terrible engines of war.

Even in the mythical days of Palamedes, of Argus, who first ranged an army in regular line of battle, the ruse in warfare was accomplishing more than the strong arm of the swordsman, and it was the ruse that enabled the Greeks to capture Troy after it had withstood a ten years' siege. The present to the delenders if a hollow wooden horse filled with a few armed men effected what thousands had vainly tried to do. The ruse of the present day represents the higher former of intelligence, and a higher form of bravery is the concomitant of the higher form of intelligence, Mind has always triumphed over matter, and to that fact is due the great success of Japanese arms. On the Russiau side the great exponents of the ruse are the Cossacks. Little has been heard of them, and if the report of an Italian paper is to be relied on, their inaction is due in some measure to the liberal use of the "crowsfoot."

The "crowsfoot" is a device used

THE CRUEL "CROW'S FOOT." The "crowsfort" is a device used essentially against cavalry. It is a dangerous obstacle, and is simply a ball of iron with three shart spikes protruding from it. The spikes are so placed that no matter how the so placed that no matter how the crowsfoot is thrown one spike stands up perpendicularly. A horse treading on this spike would at once be rendered hors de comtat. These crowsfeet are scattered over places suitable for the movement of cavalry, and are as effective against a charge of cavalry as Robert the Bruce's pitf were at the Battle of Bannockburn.

Crowsfeet can also be used to protect a camp agailst a sudder attack in the night, but their use has been practically superseded by wire entanglements. However that may be, these obstacles, according to the Italian report, are being used by both combutants, and the Cossacks, fearing a Japauese ruse, and having a wholesome dread of crowsfeet, born of experience in the Russo-Turkish war, have carefully avoided innocent looking ground in the immediate front of their enemies. Wire entanglement, which has been used with terrible effect in the recent battles is part and parcel of the ruse, the result being that advancing infantry are obstructed at a certain point,—the exact distance of which is is known—and decimated by a galling fire. The wire is laid in an intricate maze breast high, and to oversome this obsfacle the Japauese infantry battalions are served with formidable wire-cutters. But before the wire has been out the slaughter has been terrible.

In the trenches, too, the Russians have exercised their ingenuity. At Liacyang, where they vacated the trenches, they left a grim souvenir behind them. In many of the trenches they had prepared sharp pointed stakes, and under direction of their engineers placed them so that there was no escape for the foremost Japanese. As the victors leaped exultingly into the trenches they were impaled on the stakes.

The Russians have also made good use of electric land mines and fougasses, the ruse of pretending to retire precipitately being used to lure the pursu ng Japanese on the dangerous ground. The fougasse is properly used at the enemy's side of the entrenchments. It is a deep mine with a powerful change, filled with stones and concealed with grass or brushwood. In the entrenchments far behind the last Russian waited until the Japanese hurled themselves forward, and as they were about to

WAR WITH BOMBS.

When the official history to the war is written, and all its many incidents faithfully recorded, perhaps one of the most interesting to read will be the exact story of the Japanese assault between 19 and 23 September, on High Hill or tishan, the powerful fort lying to the north of Port Arthur. The Japanese were then in possession of the lines of advanced entrenchments on the lower slopes of Itshan, and were ultimately driven from them. Since then they have taken possession again.

But the plan of Russian attack on the occupied entrenchments that temporarily rid them of the Japanese, was in originality worthy of the imagination of the great Skobeloff. On the night of 22-23 September, a large body of sappers and riflemen supplied with bombs filled with guncottom moved stealthily down the slopes towards the captured lines of entrenchments, No dota'ls are given regarding the mechanism of the bombs.

The Russian official report briefly stated that the attack was very successfully carried out. The Japanese were surprised, and the snower of missiles exploding in their lines spread devastation and dreadful panic.

TEA-TABLE TRICK THAT IS GREAT FUN.

Here is a tea table trick that will Here is a tea table trick that will assonish everyone. You will need two forks, a pitcher and a toothpick. Interlace the tips of the prongs of the forks so that they hold firmly together in V shape. Then insert a toothpick through these interlaced. getter in v snape, these interlaced prongs just far enough to secure it firmly. Sometimes the pressure from one or at most two prongs is sufficient for this. The toothpick should be inserted from the inside of the V, like a tongue, between the fork handles. The other end of the toothpick should then be lodged in the mouth of a pitcher which is high enough to allow the handles of the dependant forks to clear the table. With nothing to hold it, the single toothpick will then support the two forks without tipping or breaking, a feat most puzzling to the ordinary spectator and a most fruitful source of speculation and animated discussion.

FAMOUS PEARLS OF THE WORLD.

The most famous single pearl in all the world is owned by the shah of Persia and called the Tavernier. It was named after the celebrated traveler of that name and was sold to the shah's ancestors by him for \$500,000. To-day it is probebly worth more than \$650,000. Another eastern king, the isman of Muscat, has in his collection a pearl worth \$165,000, weighing 12 1-2 carats. The daylight can be seen through it. Princess Yousoupoff's finest gem is wonderfully beautiful. It was first heard of in 1620, when Georgibus of Calais sold it to Philip of Spain for \$180,000. It has descended in a regular course to the present incumbent of the throne from one of the earliest popes, who became possessed of it in a manner which has not been told.

They are usually made uppearl after pearl being added to the set, and leading jewelers are constantly on the watch to secure more to add to the chain. Queen Victoria had a necklace of pink pearls which is wort \$80,000, and the dowager empress Germany has one of 32 pearls whi would easily sell for \$125,000. The women of the Rothschild family have gems of this sort which far exceed in value those owned by royalty. Baroness Gustave de Rothschild possesses one made up of five rows of saids which is valued at \$200,000. These are all of the truly celebrated pearls.
