RUNAWAY CAR IN QUEL?
Several excursionists to the Ontario Agricultural College injured.
Quebec, June 23.—The first accident that has ever occurred on the street railway during the many excursions that have been held to the Ontario Agricultural College happened about noon yesterday on the arrival of the farmers' excursion from West Simcoe. A street car was placed on the top of the grade, the line running to the C. P. R. station. A man was made for the car. When it was crowded the car started down the steep incline to the C. P. R. station and ran into a coal car standing on the siding near Allan's dam. Had it not been for this obstruction the crowded car would have run into the river.

There were over a dozen injured, four of whom were taken to the General Hospital, but their injuries are slight. Every pane of glass in the car was broken, and the car and smashed by the concussion. Several were thrown out and others jumped. The other occupants of the car are suffering from the shock and cuts from the glass. It is stated that some of the excursionists turned the brakes and let the car loose. Amongst those who were most seriously injured were: Mr. and Mrs. C. Johnston, Simcoe, the former having his head crushed and suffering from concussion of the brain; the lady suffering injury to the thigh; J. Taylor, Simcoe, chest crushed; D. Cameron, again on forehead; Charles McDermott, again behind ear, requiring several stitches; W. T. Bates, Cremona, ribs broken; W. McKillan, Duntroon, nose broken; Mrs. A. Hensley, Duntroon, head cut; W. Campbell, Callingswood, head cut; J. Lockard, side injured. The guilty party who released the brake is under arrest.

obligations to the public and dated to perform. It is at least our right to make an application of this kind whatever.
Dr. Mitchell—I move, Mr. Chairman, that we now adjourn.
The adjournment was declared carried.
Messrs. Turill and McQueen appeared as the Commissioners were departing and said they had reached an understanding re the Park House. An afternoon session was accordingly set to deal with it.
The adjourned meeting opened at half past one o'clock. Mr. McQueen and Mr. Turill were present but they could come to no agreement in reference to the Park House license. Fred. Moore thought it was strictly an agreement made but found that it was unsatisfactory and the two men are just as far away from an agreement as they ever were and as a result the license will die tomorrow.
John Pleasance asked for a transfer of his license to Mrs. Pleasance, but he was informed by Mr. Smith that the Board would not do it.
"Your case is in the hands of the Provincial Secretary," said Mr. Smith. "You will have to make application there."
Mr. Pleasance explained that he was not responsible for the petitions being sent to the Department. His friends had been seeking to assist him. He had never received any reason why his hotel was refused a license. If there were any charges to be made against him he was ready to defend himself and stand or fall by the outcome.
