IN 44 HOURS.  
His Robert Bond's Calculated Passage  
From Old World to New.

The actual time involved in a jour-  
ney between New York and London,  
or vice versa, is best proved by the  
statement of the time occupied in  
forwarding the mail, which is sub-  
ject to no delay, writes Sir Robert  
Bond, President of Newfoundland. The  
United States postoffice department  
issued a statement last year show-  
ing the average time which actually  
elapsed between the mails leaving  
New York postoffice and reaching the  
London postoffice, as follows:

Few will fail to notice, then, that  
under the most favorable circum-  
stances it requires six days twelve  
hours to make the journey from New  
York to London.

By way of Newfoundland it could  
be made in five days four hours, or  
a saving of thirty-two hours in all  
over the present actual running time,  
with only about seventy-two hours  
of ocean travel—viz., sixty-seven and  
one-half hours between the British  
Isles and Newfoundland, distance 1,-  
650 miles, and two and one-half  
hours between Port aux Basques in  
Newfoundland, and Assey, in North  
Sydney, distance sixty-five miles.  
The time occupied in making the  
ocean trip is calculated on the  
Deutschland's best record, attained  
last year, of 588 miles in twenty-  
four hours, or twenty-four and one-  
half miles an hour. If turbine ships  
could be put on the service with a  
mean speed of thirty-six miles an  
hour the time of coming from the  
British Isles to Newfoundland would  
be forty-four hours.

A London despatch recently pub-  
lished a sketch that the Southeastern  
and London, Chatham and Dover  
Railway Company had ordered for  
delivery next season a twenty-five  
knot turbine steamer, 300 by 40  
feet, to cover the passage between  
England and France in forty-five  
minutes. If successful, it is expected  
the turbine system will be extended  
to Atlantic traffic.

It is within the bounds of possi-  
bility, then, by the application of  
the turbine system to bridge the At-  
lantic via Newfoundland so as to  
bring the old world and the new  
within forty-four hours, or less than  
two days' journey, of each other, or,  
by placing on the route such a  
steamer as the Deutschland, to re-  
duce the journey to sixty-seven and  
one-half hours.

I have the fullest confidence in the  
project I have just outlined, and I  
also believe that if the British ship-  
ping men do not avail themselves of  
this route our farseeing and enter-  
prising American neighbors will do  
so.

According to Cocker.

Edward Cocker, who lived in the  
reign of Charles II., is chiefly known  
to the present generation by the  
common colloquialism, "According to  
Cocker," which means in accordance  
with arithmetical rules. I saw the  
other day amid the treasures of a  
private collector a copy of the first  
edition of Cocker's immortal work  
on arithmetic, published by "T.  
Passenger at the Three Bibles on  
London Bridge." Only two, or at  
least three, perfect copies are known  
to the book collector. One is in the  
British Museum. This particular  
copy, its brown morocco pitifully  
faded, bears on its title page the  
inscription "Cocker's Arithmetick,  
perused and published by John Haw-  
kins by the Author's correct copy." It  
contains what purports to be a  
portrait of "ingenious Cocker."

Experts, however, shake their heads  
over the authenticity of this work  
of art. There are many engraved  
portraits of the epoch, but there  
was only one Cocker. The British  
Museum copy has no portrait, and  
there is too much reason to fear that  
this embellishment was added by  
some ingenious owner. Cocker died  
in 1675.—Liverpool Daily Post.

Impressions While Drowning.

Most of us, I expect, at some  
time or other, have wondered what  
it feels like to be drowned. If we  
have never seen any one drowning,  
we mean by this that we wonder  
whether it is at all like what it is  
represented to be—whether one's  
whole past life passes before one's  
eyes like a dream; whether one spends  
one's last few moments in wishing one  
had spent more profitably the last few  
years. If we have seen people drown-  
ing, we wonder whether it feels as  
bad as it looks. Now, I cannot pre-  
tend to have been nearly drowned.  
Nor can I say what it feels like to  
sink after a prolonged struggle, in  
calm water within sight of land. But  
I can say what it feels like to be  
quite convinced that one is going to  
be drowned, and I am happy to  
know, from personal experience, that  
the feeling is one merely of disap-  
pointment. One is simply annoyed—  
certainly not angry; certainly not  
afraid.—Hubert Walter, in Black  
wood's.

Australia and the Navy.

The Commonwealth Senate at Mel-  
bourne on Tuesday passed the Naval  
Agreement Bill. The agreement,  
which is based on the conclusions ar-  
rived at by the Premiers' Conference  
in London, is for a Colonial contri-  
bution of £200,000 annually for 10  
years, and is terminable at two  
years' notice after the eighth year.  
The naval force on the Australian  
station is to consist of one first,  
two second, and four third-class  
cruisers, and four sloops. A branch  
of the Royal Naval Reserve will be  
formed in Australia, consisting of 25  
officers, 700 men, and four of the  
ships mentioned above (the other  
ships being kept in commission), to  
be manned by 1,600 Australians  
and New Zealanders, to be paid at  
Australian rates. The Bill had al-  
ready passed the House of Representa-  
tives.

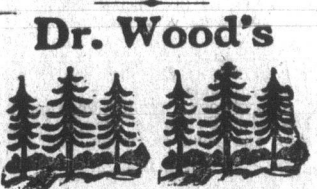
