THE FRUIT GROWERS.

Close of the Convention at Leamington—A Winter Show.

Leamington, Nov. 27. The Fruit-growers' Association, before concluding their annual meeting yesterday, decided upon holding their next meeting in Toronto. A plan was also discussed and decided upon for holding a winter fruit fair in Toronto at the same time. The intention is to interest all fruit-growers in this way and bring them together at a competitive fair, thus stimulating them to more earnest effort. If successful the venture will probably be made an annual event, doing for fruit-growers what the Guelph Fat Stock Show does for live stock breeders.

The sessions were of a practical nature so far as the fruit-growers were concerned. They spent the morning and afternoon listening to a series of addresses by the experienced station superintendents. The horticultural societies held their meetings in the Sunday school of the Methodist church, and listened to a number of interesting papers. A large number of ladies and gentlemen from outside points arrived in town this morning to attend the horticultural societies' meetings.

Dr. James M. J. Smith, President of the O. A. C., Guelph, occupied the chair at the morning meeting, when the work of the fruit experiment stations was reported upon. Prof. H. L. Hutt of the O. A. C. spoke upon new fruits. At Guelph he said they had raised a large number of seedlings during the year. They had given attention to apples, peaches, plums and some small fruits. From Japan they had received a seedling of a handsome apple, something of the wealth type, which might be valuable. A Parry seedling, originating on Zoho Island, was also promising. It was of a hardy winter variety, and quite small. The Ireland seedling peach from Owen Sound was a very showy and promising fruit. The emerald plum, originated by E. D. Smith of Winona, a very early plum, ripening about August 1st, was of high quality. Keen's seedling plum, from Orillia, was also showy and promising. The Crosby gooseberry, grown near Highland Creek, was probably a good one to grow. It was large and free from mildew, being the only one of the English type that is free from mildew.

Smith's Giant Black Cap, a very large black raspberry, originated by A. M. Smith of St. Catharines, also promised well. Prof. W. T. Macoun of Ottawa followed Prof. Hutt. He said that the principal work of the fruit experiment stations was to put the seedlings sent in on record, and after they had been thoroughly tested to send out reports upon them. There were 100 many varieties of fruit and poor ones at that, now being grown, and the experiment stations were working with a view to finding out what were the best varieties to grow in each locality.

Mr. L. Woolverton of Grimsby presented the Secretary's report of the work of the fruit stations during the year. There were now fourteen such stations, and the establishment of another at New Liskeard was being considered. The stations were also assisting in the work of arranging for a descriptive book upon Ontario fruit.

MUST TREAT SOLDIERS WELL.

The Bavarian Chamber of Representatives Takes a Firm Stand.

Munich, Nov. 26.—The Bavarian Chamber of Representatives has unanimously voted a resolution requiring the dismissal from the service of all officers or non-commissioned officers found guilty of ill-treating soldiers, and the War Minister, General Baron von Asch, has approved the resolution, declaring that the Bavarian army authorities are already conforming with the spirit of the resolution and have even dismissed two officers, who did not exercise necessary watchfulness. The Minister approved summary treatment, especially in the case of brutal non-commissioned officers.

The Minister of Education has recommended the appointment of Mr. L. A. Green, B.A., Sault Ste. Marie, as inspector of public schools for a portion of the district of Algoma.
