FLOOD CONDITION

Saskatchewan River Still in Flood -Over 800 Homeless.

ity Special Wire to the Courier. Edmonton, Alb., June 29.—Flood conditions on the Saskatchewan river here at midnight were practically unchanged, the river rose gradually all day, and at 11 o'clock was 38 feet above low water mark. All the low land on the flats surrounding the city are covered with water, and it is esimated that 800 families, mostly of the poorer classes, who live in shacks along the river banks, are temporarily homeless. The police and fire depart-ments worked heroically all day and were aided by hundreds of citizens in removing their children and household goods to the higher ground. The water is level with the top of the low level bridge used as a railway and passenger bridge, and also by the Canadian Northern.
