London, Dec. 14.-A despatch from Pietermaritzburg states that a report has reached there saying that Generals Buller and Clery surprised the Boers by a front and flank attack, utterly defeating them, after a short, sharp engagement. The enemys retreat was cut off by General Clery's force, and the enemy to the number of 12,000 were compelled to surrender. The British troops then pushed on to Ladysmith, thus raising the siege. The war office has no official confirmation of this report, and does not cred-

CHURCHILL ESCAPES FROM PRETORIA.

Lorenzo Marques, Dec. 14. - Winston Churchill, the newspaper correspondent and former officer of the Fourth Hussars, who was captured at the time of the armored train disaster near Estcourt, Nov. 16, has escaped from Pretoria.

STOCKS ON THE JUMP.

At the Stock Exchange to-day at 2 o'clock Rand mines suddenly jumped up £1 on rumors that Gen. Clery had entered Ladysmith, and that Gen. Buller had captured 3,000 Boers. The officials do not credit the reports, as, they add, the relief of the place at such an early date is believed to be practically impossible.

THE KILLED AND WOUNDED.

London, Dec. 14.—The war offices have received a list of the killed and have received a list of the killed and wounded at Magersfontein. The official report gives the total number of killed, wounded and missing of all arms in the engagement of Sunday and Monday at Magesfontein as \$17.

There were 15 officers killed and four wounded, and in addition five are missing and one is known to have been made prisoner.
