A MAN WHO HAS LOST HIS HEAD.

Hon. Webster Davis, late under-secretary of the United States Cabinet, but now champion twister of the lion's tail for the election campaign of 1900, should study up a little before uttering such a mixture of misapplied words as are hereafter quoted from one of his orations on the South African war. The New York papers report the following word picture as falling from his lips: "The Boers of South Africa are torchbearers who blazed through the primeval forests of the southern part of that great Dark continent." If Mr. Davis was taken in hand and asked to analyze that sentence after the fashion of a school boy in an English literature class he would find himself in deep water. He would learn that pathways and lines are blazed through primeval forests with axes, not torches, and that Africa, south of the Zambest river is practically treeless. This is the kind of rot with which the politicians feed the great American electorate every fourth year and the large section of the American people and press are howling against the atrocities committed by the British as described by this veracious witness on the spot who blazes pathways with fire that is never used through primeval forests that never existed,

HOW THEY EXPECT TO SECURE DOLLAR WHEAT.

An International Farmers' Conference, to be held in Paris on the week between July 9 and 16, is expected to recommend to farmers to restrict the wheat production by limiting the area, and to agree not to sell wheat anywhere for less that a dollar per bushel. European farmers have suffered more from low prices than have those of this country, as their land is dearer, and they must produce much more to make the crop a paying one. There is not much faith that such an agreement will be kept, even if made. Probably in most localities where wheat does not now pay, less will be grown the coming two years, whether there is or is not an agreement to restrict production. Dollar wheat sounds cheap to men whose wheat must cost from a dollar and a quarter to a dolfar and a half a bushel. But there are millions of acres available for wheat sowing where the price of a dollar a bushel for wheat means unlimited prosperity, and no agreement made in Paris can prevent such farmers from growing all the wheat possible while the price remains so high. There is much more chance for wheat to rule higher than it has through its increasing use by people who have only found out during the years it has ruled at low price that it is the best grain for bread.

The Ottawa citizen gives a list of 16 old people who have died within the year at Richmond, Ont., and whose average age was 79 years. The oldest was 96 and the youngest 63. Up here those people would just about be con sidered in their prime.

We are pleased to announce that the Ontario legislature will conclude its business this week. It is safe, how ever, to add that Premier Ross is probably just as much pleased as w are. He has had his own troubles with a mutinous following to keep him busy of late.

Both the Dominion parliament and the Ontario Legislature seem favorably disposed towards making India famine fund grants. The Michigan Sugar Beet, a periodical published in the interest of beet sugar, says: A sugar factory in a community means a demand for farm labor. It is a profitable industry for the farmer and a big help to the business interests of the city, It means that a 500-ton factory will pay to farmers for beets each year over \$300,000. There is five times more money in raising sugar beets than in any other crop.

Many of the farmers in the vicinity of Toledo, Ohio, have had special wagons built for sending their produce to market, with wheels fitted to run on the electric street railway tracks. The farmers load the wagons and drive them up to the nearest trolley line, where a motor car picks them up and hauls them to the city. The city council has granted the run to these rail wagons on the streets, and as the hauling is done almost wholly at night, it interferes very little with the city traffic. There is an idea for our new county electric road when it is built.

A plan for forcing vegetable growth has been perfected, as he believes, by G. M. Sherman, of Springfield, Mass. whereby several seasons' natural growth can be crowded into one, by supplying directly to the roots of the plant, tree, or shrub the chemicals needed in its growth. Mr. Sherman employs e utensil into which the chemicals are supplied from the surface and the storage chamber becomes sur rounded with a thick growth of roots that feed on the chemicals as they filter through the "machine," During last summer the process was tried with two bushes, each a year old. One was planted under as favorable natural conditions as possible, and grew to the height of three feet and bore seven blossoms. The second, equipped with the automatic "pusher," grew to more than fifteen feet in height and bore two thousand blossoms. Mr. Sherman believes shade trees may be brought to a useful size in a season or two. The fact that the roots do not spread out would make it necessary, however, to anchor the tree against the pressure of high winds.
