A HALIFAX HOLOGAUST

Over \$300,000 Worth of Property Destroyed.

Over Twenty Buildings and Wharves Swept By Flames Blown By a Terrific Gale-Insurance Said to Be Les Than Half the Loss-One Woman Killed By a Tree Blown Down-Firemen Injured.

Halifax, N. S., Sept. 16.—Halifax suffered a fire loss of over \$300,000 yesterday afternoon by a conflagration which swept a part of the harbor front. When the fire broke out in the large wooden warehouse of N. & M. Smith the wind was blowing a gale over the city at the rate of 52 miles an hour as officially stated by the signal station at the citadel. The flames swept north and south along Water street, destroying twenty buildings and wharves. The firemen gained control after four hours work. The military and naval fire brigades, numbering about 200 men, were called out with their equipment to fight the fire and protect property. To accomplish the latter purpose they were drawn up in a cordon with fixed bayonets and kept on duty for many hours. many hours.

The loss is estimated at \$310,000 with insurance of \$150,000. While the gale was at its highest two women were on their way to see the fire. ROOSEVELT IN DANGER.

Report From Mexico That Spaniards Plotted to Kill Mim.

Houston, Texas, Sept. 16.—E. Lee Hawes, editor of The Pan-American World, at Mexico City, who has just arrived here, says that a plot hatched in Barcelona, Spain, to assassinate President Roosevelt, has been frustrated in Vera Cruz, Mexico. The Mexican police were "tipped off," according to Hawes, and when the would-be assassins reached Vera Cruz they were apprehended. Where they are at present is not known. Hawes says that the Mexican Government has rigidly suppressed all the facts regarding the plot. The Spanish Government, he says, is trying to uncover the conspiracy.

Killed By Fall of Decayed Bridge.

Stillwater, Man., Sept. 16.—The bridge across Lake St. Croix, which is half a mile long, extending to the Wisconsin side, caught fire yesterday afternoon. The fire created some commotion and the fire apparatus, in responding to the alarm, was followed by the usual crowd of persons. The fire had so weakened one of the spang of the rather ancient structure that. fire had so weakened one of the spans of the rather ancient structure that when the fire apparatus and the crowd attempted to cross it if fell into the water, twenty feet below. About 20 persons were precipitated with the wreckage into the water. Adolph Boo. aged 22, and George McGrath, aged 16, were killed and five others were seriously injured.
